An official announcement tills week stated that S. I. N. U. had acquired the four-acre Hall tract on South Thompsen street, facing the college, thus moving the plens for a cateria one step nearer completion. The project to purchase property was begun about two years and advanced little by little until the entitle troutage of 800 feet on Thompson street is owned by S. I. N. U. son street is owned by S. I. N. U. Plans are already under way to convert the building on the corner of Thompson street and Chautauqua falo a modern, up-to-date cafeteria for students and faculty members. The cafeteria will seat 400 persons and will be operated by a non-profit corporation affiliated with the college.

The controversy started when a group in Carbondale began circulating petitions to abolish the retail sale of liquor in town and in Carbondale township. Last week an editorial opposing the abolishment was printed in the Egyptian; immediately a deluge of answers to the editorial came in. THE DRYS ARE ALL WET

Last week the Egyptian carried an editorial entitled "We Hate to Say it-But". What we hated to say was that an attempt was being made to bring prohibition back to Carbondale. The way in which we chose to say it involved an apparently overly subtle reference to the idealism of the Atlantic Charter whose "noble tenets" we found to be jeopardized by the "dry" movement. Students of the dry camp, however, take their crusades "straight", so that the Voice of S.I.N.U. columns this week are no less an attack on alcohol than an eloquent defense of the Atlantic Charter So we can rest easily on one score, at least.

It might well be pointed out, however, that the undercurrent of reaction which is propelling the prohibition movement nationally bodes nothing good for that spirit of broad-mindedness which is necessary for a healthy post-war world. In the sense that Othe back-to-prohibition movement is a manifestation of a social retrogression, usually symptomatic of wartime psychology, there is a danger to liberal aspirations stemming from this repressive crusade. This, it seems to us, is a disturbing fundam-ntal which is worth thinking about.

However, the issue in the present controversy is not the Atlantic Charter; it is prohibition, and on that issue we take our stand as wanting no return to the corruption and moral corrosion which it inevitably engenders. Alcoholic extremism may be an evil, true ewough. But prohibition is in and of itself an immoderate and unmoderatable condition which is forced by its very nature to beget evil. In other words, we can have moderation with liquor but only wanton extremism with prohibition of liquor.
