

Southern Has Less Than Half Space Per Student Needed

The above chart shows the way space per student has been falling at Southern Illinois University

at Southern Illinois University since 1920.
Prepared by a faculty-student hegislative committee, to demonstrate the achool's critical need for new buildings, this chart shows that not since the early 1980's has there been enough space per student available in Southern's physical state.

This year, Southern's physical hant provides only 62 square feet per student, compared to 155 square feet recommended as a minimum requirement by the Prevident's Commission on Higher Education.

Other data compiled by the University committee show that the current national average at col-leges all over the country—crowd-

us they are by the pest-war influx of students—is 126 square feet per student, compared to Southern's 62.

"Moreover, the chart shows that: Southern's growth in student enrollment has been a steady one, and that the present enrollment of 3,000 students is not an inflated student population that may be rected to disappear once the reasof veterans is over. "The plain truth is that Southern's student body is continuing—in regular rate of growth, but we have not had buildings constructed to keep up with the rate of growth. Southern has not builties classroom building since 1988. Moreover, the chart shows that

growth. Southern has not builtier classroom building since 1928. "We must have not one or two buildings, but a major building-program to 'catch up' with the student body we now have. "That is why we are saking the' General Assembly to appropriate 526,955,170 for 1949-51 to build the buildings we need right now."

Dear Nan:

Dear Nan:

At last I have time to tell you how I am enjoying life as a student at Southern Illinois Normal University. It is such a new experience for a timid freshman and especially exciting for a country girl coming from a small village to a big city like Carbondale with its 2,000 inhabitants. First, before I tell ivou about my studies, I want to describe the large campus and the building where I attend classes. There is only one big edifice which is the largest school building I have ever seen. This is called the Main Building and was erected in 1874 at the stupendous sum of \$265,000.

My landlady told me that there was My landlady told me that there was quite a bit of controversy among the legislators concerning the location of the Normal school, DuQuoin, Centralia, Murphysboro, Carlyle and other Southern Illinois towns were bidding for the state school, but Carbondale won out. The Board selected a tract of land—20 acres—about three-quarters of a mile south of the I. C. station improved the edition. quarters of a nule south of the l. C. station immediately adjacent to the right of way of the railroad on the west side. The site had been a bare ficiel, but more recently a large strawberry patch.
