Each year all seniors must register with the Placement Service in order to meet degree requirements and for the purpose of securing positions at graduation time or later.

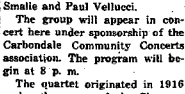

This "whole affair" dating back to something that happened two years ago, I would like to know the writer's source of information.

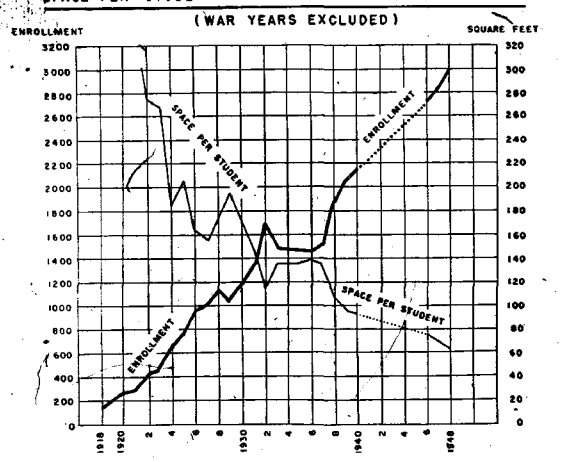

Carbondale, Illinois
October 5, 1880

Dear Nan:
At last I have time to tell you how I am enjoying life as a student at Southern Illinois Normal University. It is such a new experience for a timid freshman and especially exciting for a country girl coming from a small village to a big city like Carbondale with its 2,000 inhabitants.

My landlady told me that there was quite a bit of controversy among the legislators concerning the location of the Normal school. DaQuinn, Centralia, Murphysboro, Carlyle and other Southern Illinois towns were bidding for the state school, but Carbondale won out. The Board selected a tract of land—20 acres—about three-quarters of a mile south of the U. S. station immediately adjacent to the right of way of the railroad on the west side.

Although the campus is bare and far from being attractive, the one building that greets it is certainly an imposing brick structure. The architecture is the Norman style, with trimmings around the windows and archways of sandstone brought up from Boskewell. The two stories above the ground basement and one story in the Mansard part make this practically a four-story building.

tor and his family. The two full stories above are used for classrooms, offices and study hall; the Mansard or top floor consists of a library, museum and lecture and study rooms. There are really four stories of classrooms, each graded with some steps leading to the first story above the basement; but the doorway most used is the flight of stone steps at the front of the building on the east facing the railroad.

The president, Dr. Robert Allyn, told the student body that the Board had great plans for a beautiful campus extending east of the "U" tracks. Included in the plans, he said, will be a fountain just in front of the east entrance. Also along the road that circles up toward the front entrance will be picked attractive and ornamental hitching posts to accommodate the people who drive out to the campus in their surreys, buggies and wagons to see their entertainments. These hitching posts will also serve some of the students who live three or four miles out of town who ride to school daily to and from school.

I must close this long letter and get my studies and also do my mending. I miss my mother who always helped me keep my clothes in shape. Certainly one learns more than just mere book knowledge when away at school. The dust ruff is a real nuisance. I'll be along in attention. The wonder is that folks here in Carbondale are quite hard on skirts which frequently catch on a rough board or a protruding nail in the worn planks. Sometimes a lady's style would change to shorter skirts, even if it is incident to show one's ankles.

In my next letter I'll tell you about my studies and my teachers. They are both hard. Sometimes I don't get to bed 'till nine o'clock.

More Students In Winter Term Than Year Ago

While the customary winter drop in enrollment is in evidence, there are still 176 more students attending Southern this term than there was a year ago.

An analysis of current enrollment figures just released by the Registrar's office shows a total of 2,507 students enrolled, compared to 2,331 a year ago.

The number of veterans is down sharply, 1,171 this winter compared to 1,434 for the winter term last year.

Enrollment by branches shows the following figures: College of Education, 1,603; College of Liberal Arts and Sciences, 849; College of Commerce and Professions, 613; Graduate School, 142.

There are still more than two boys to every girl student—1,967 men compared to 930 girls.

More than a third of this winter's student body are freshman—688. Other enrollment figures by classes are: sophomore, 6,111 juniors, 5,675; seniors, 3,291 graduates, 1,434; post-graduates, 257; unclassified, 1,051.

The winter term student body below from 68 Illinois counties, 19 other states, four foreign countries and the Territory of Hawaii. There are five foreign students, one from Hawaii, 60 from other states, and 2,331 Illinois students.

Foreign students include one from China, one from Iraq, two from India, one from Mexico. Students from other states include 20 from Missouri, 6 from Kentucky, 5 each from Texas and Indiana, 4 from Michigan, 3 each from Iowa, New York, and Oklahoma, and 1 each from Delaware, Florida, Kansas, Maine, Minnesota, New Jersey, North Carolina, North Dakota, Ohio, Pennsylvania, and West Virginia.

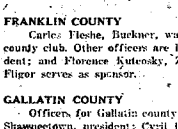
