If each organization or group responsible for a notice appearing on the bulletin board would see that the sign is removed after it has served its purpose, this would be a fair return for the privilege of using this board as a means of announcement. Also it is only just to others to be reasonable about the size of the notices. A modest placard advertising a group program serves the purpose as well as a large announcement. 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Dean Wham Writes For Open Book of Kappa Phi Kappa

"There is no concept in greater need of definition than that of the teachers' college," Dean George D. Wham states in his article "The Status of the Teachers' College," status of the Teathers Conege, which appeared in a fall publica-tion of the Open Book magazine

which appear of the Open Book and of Kappa Phi Kappa.
According to Dean Wham this concept has in it two wrong mischievous implications: first, that have' college is not the heavy of the property of the prop chievous implications: first, that "the teachers' college is not the home of scholarship and culture"; second, "that the teachers' college is debilitated by its professional training and thus rendered inelig-ible to classification as a real col-lege."

ible to classification as a real col-lege."

The first misconception, Dean Wham explains, would be dispelled by a careful inspection of any standardized teachers' college. "Such an inspection will disclose not only a faculty sound in scholar-ship and strong in teaching ability, but also a standardized curriculum so organized as to provide an academic major for 20 to 24 semester hours, an academic mor of 16 to 0 semester hours, and -sufficient. 20 semester hours, and -sufficient

20 semester bours, and -sufficient other subjects to guarantee a spread of culture."

In stracking the second implication Dean Wham takes each phase of education and, applying the definition of culture as "sympathetic insight into contemporary civilization," demonstrates the cultural significance of the phase as such. "Indeed," he comments, "the cultural texts are the strategies of the strategies of ducas. tural value of the study of educa-tion is so fundamental that it may be questioned whether culture in its best sense can be achieved with-

ut it."

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
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
