Instead of nilitant support, they find America's young men and women uniting with the American Students' union on April 22 and voicing disapproval of war—whether waged by this government on any government.

Where is instriction? Did it is the control of the

war—whether waged by this government of any government.

Where is patriotism? Did it go the way of thousands of Americans who fought for this country in the last war? Surely patriotism means not only dying for one's country, but living for it as well. Problems never before faced by youth must now be met by the present younger generation. Enemies far more malicious than Indians menace their future happiness. Insecurities just as great as the insecurities of life in a barren land confront them with a taunting challenge. Is it no wonder that today's young-ster turns from war to battle these new foes of society?

In his struggle for life he conceives his new philosophy. Just as his forefathers puts faith in a world peace. Disease, sickness, crime, and poverty are enough to deal with, besides fighting one's neighbor.

Super-patriotic organizations need have Super-patriotic organizations need have no fear for the patriotism of American youth. Their willingness to defend their shores was shown in Administration auditorium recently when the assemblage voted en masse to change one resolution of the A. S. U, from "I will not support this government in any war it may undertake." to read. "any foreign war."


