NEW COMMENCEMENT WITH PHOTOS IS ORIGINATED BY LOGAN AND HALL

New Ideas Are Published In The Illinois Teacher and Chicago Daily News

C. C. Logan, director of Visual Education, and Hal Hall, principal of University High School, recently inaugurated a new commencement system that all public schools could profitably adopt. As pointed out in the Illinois Teacher, official publication March issue, 1939, and a resume in the Chicago Daily News, Monday, April 17, 1939, the idea is rapidly becoming more prominent among modern educators of Illinois.

This new idea is different in three ways from the former commencement exercises. First, there is no speaker; second, the graduating seniors are given a greater prominence; and third, a current social problem of significance is introduced for the consideration of the audience.

The program was tried out for the first time last year at University High, and worked extremely well. A one act play, "Eleven Million," shown by H. S. seniors, portrayed the futility of war and the current social problems of this age. "Similarly," says the article, "other social problems might be presented in a way that would stimulate the audience to look more deeply into them and to search out solutions for themselves." After the play, thirty minutes of pictures of U. High activities such as classes, clubs, band, orchestra, athletics, outings, steamboat excursions, and senior roundups were shown. After the activities were projected on the screen, trophies, awards, and diplomas were given to the seniors.

This system has encouraged amateur photographers, more cooperation between the students, and at the same time gives the seniors more prominence. The total expense last year was under forty dollars for the entire visual aids program. Technicolor films can also be used for more effective scenery.

At the program last year, seven hundred persons attended with only 35 students graduating. The year before under the usual system, only one hundred and twenty-five were present with the approximately the same number graduating.

"This feature seems to have much to recommend, since the parents will be more or less informed because their children are taking part, and the seniors will be acquiring desired attitudes and significant information as they prepare for the commencement program," the article stated.

The complete program, including the play, pictures and customary presentations of diplomas, awards, and trophies, requires only about an hour and fifteen minutes to present, which according to Mr. Logan and Hal Hall, "seems to be about the right length."

At the thirty-second annual meeting of the Illinois State Academy of Science to be held Friday and Saturday, May 5-6, at Springfield, Ill., Dr. Thomas F. Barton, Dr. William Gersbacher, Dr. Bruce Merwin, and Charles Mayfield will represent S. I. N. U.

This is one of the most outstanding organizations in science in the state.

Two members are serving on committees of the academy. Dr. Barton, head of the geography department, is on the committee on membership, and Dr. Bruce Merwin, placement department head, is serving on the committee on the conservation of archeological and historical sites.

There will be eleven different sections in the line of Agriculture, Anthropology, biology, chemistry, education, geography, geology, physics, psychology, and zoology, which come under one division, and papers of general interest which come under another. These sections will meet Friday when various problems and ideas will be discussed. On Saturday, field trips will be taken by the various sections.

Dr. Barton, who is chairman of the geography section sponsored by the Illinois chapter of the National Council of Geography Teachers, will speak on "Recreation in the Shawnee National Forest Purchase Class." Two former members of Southern will also speak in the geography section. Hugh Lemons, who is now a graduate student at the University of Illinois, will speak on "Geographic Aspects of Interstate Transition," and H. O. Lathrop of S. I. N. U. will make a talk on "A Day of Tomatoes."

Dr. Gersbacher, zoology department head, and Charles Mayfield, Student Council president, will speak on the zoology section on "An Experiment in Conducting Laboratory Work in Zoology Classes."

Thad Snow Discloses Interesting Facts Regarding Recent Share-Cropper Demonstration

Mr. Thad Snow, a cotton planter of Southwestern Missouri, addressed some two hundred students in the auditorium Friday morning, April 21. His talk was confined to the events leading up to the recent share-cropper demonstration of the sharecroppers in his part of the country and the results it has produced.

Mr. Snow's home is in Charleston, Mo. and he owns over one thousand acres of cotton land which is tilled by some twenty-two share-cropper families. His land clearly fell on a life of expense. However, he does not have the income which is characteristic of Illinois farmers. He speaks rather slowly and distinctly, and his statements are easily understood. Mr. Snow's body is scrawny, and he has had numerous operations for rheumatism, but at the St. Louis Post-Dispatch and the ability as a writer is attested by the fact that his recent articles relating to the share-cropper demonstration were reprinted verbatim.

The rebellion of the sharecroppers due to the fact that the planters were taking government money which rightfully belonged to the sharecroppers by declaring that all their help was "day-labor."

The share-cropper was given the choice of being moved off the farm or working as a "day-laborer." The farmers to not make changes to live on and the share-croppers had to be moved off the land because the planter was trying to "steal" more money in this case in protest under the capable leadership of a Negro named Whofoord. They stayed on the roadside from Tuesday until Saturday and then some of them were permitted to go back to their homes. However, the planters were very angry and several of the croppers were not permitted to return to their own homes. About three hundred were placed in empty houses and stables in Charleston without an opportunity of earning a living. That condition still exists.

Although Mr. Snow is a planter, he is in sympathy with the share-croppers. Undoubtedly the planters a large majority of them at least—have treated the crop-

Sociology Students Visit WPA and TVA

Dr. R. B. Bowden, the head of the sociology department, together with five sociology students, on Wednesday morning, April 12, went on a T. V. A. trip, leaving Carbondale at 7:30 and returning on Sunday, April 16, at 7 a. m. The purpose of the visit of the T. V. A. area, which extends into five states, Kentucky, Tennessee, Mississippi, Alabama and Georgia.

Dr. Bowden comments, "There are many signs of prosperity and very little W. P. A. The country is full of people in that area an opportunity to work and at the same time have an optimistic view of the future."

In Corinth, Miss., the sociologists had an interview with Mr. McGee, of the Alcorn Electric Power company office who stated that certain company turbines electricity for the county and, instead of being privately owned, the government has purchased it for the T. V. A. project. Every person in the community who uses electricity is a stockholder since the company is run on a cooperative basis without profit to any one individual. The stockholders appoint a board of directors who are responsible for the management of the company. To be a stockholder in the company one has to pay a ten dollar membership fee and from then on the electric bill will be from twenty-five cents to one dollar, not exceeding this amount. Construction of a similar type are going up all over this area. The installation of the power to the home in the rural district has been lowered to twelve dollars for each customer. This amount has reached a minimum through the elimination of the unnecessary positions which were present prior to governmental control.

At Muscle Shoals (Wilson Dam) the group interviewed Mr. Schaeffer, who said: "This area is important because it uses hydroelectricity for the fertilizer in the United States. Since this area does not contain such a great amount of the fertilizer the government has taken steps to improve the soil by sending agriculture specialists to the district. The specialists found that phosphate was much needed and started the farmers using it for the erosion and rebuilding of the soil. Using interest as the American farmer has done this is the first time the Commerce Department has cooperated with the county agents in buying fertilizer and terracing very enthusiastically."

PLAN DISPOSES OF CONTINGENT LIABILITIES

Since the Oshlock appropriation was not in session in proportion to the increase in construction, the total being plan was put into effect.

Passed and approved by the Student Council, December 1939.

In former years a contingent liability has been born up through the failure of students to fulfil Oshlock obligations at the time they are first assessed. Therefore it is resolved that all contingent liabilities created by former Oshlock debts (previous to the 1939 school year) be cancelled, and that there shall be no further contingent liabilities created by Oshlock debts in the future. In order to avoid this possibility, the following plan has been accepted:

First all Oshlocks for each year must be claimed and paid for by July 1 of the year issued.

Second, if a student's payment for the year do not total enough on three terms, he must make up the remainder at the prorated rate of eight cents per term.

Third, this plan is to be considered final operative hereafter.
