The new WPA administration has decided to gradually decrease expenditures of its art projects (music, art, and acting), since they are giving work to many artists, actors, and musicians who will never be able to get private employment in their fields. BROSS AWARD
IS \$15000
THIS YEAR

Awarded for Article
On Relationship of
Religion, Learning

LAKE FOREST, ILL., Feb. 17.—More than 2,500 persons from the 48 states, the District of Columbia, and 39 foreign countries have made inquiries of Lake Forest (Ill.) College concerning the \$15,000 Bross prize to be awarded by the trustees of the College next year for "the best book or manuscript, heretofore unpublished, on the connection, relation, and mutual bearing of the Humanities, the Social Sciences, the Physical Sciences, the Biological Sciences, or any branch of knowledge, with and upon the Christian religion."

Bross inquiries have ranged from postcard to the fullest inquiry and even to the submission of manuscripts, and have come from such far away places as Arabia, Australia, China, Ethiopia, French West Africa, Hawaii, India, Japan, Java, the Philippine Islands, Syria, South Africa, most European nations, and many South American countries.

Besides the individual requests for information, applications for the award have been alive to the unusual possibilities of this contest and have written suggesting that material be sent to certain members of their faculties whom they think capable of submitting manuscripts. Writers' groups and International scholarship commissions have asked for quantities of the circulars so that they may distribute them to those who should be writing.
