New restrictions on operation of automobiles on the SIU campus, leading eventually to the total elimination of student cars in the City of Carbondale, have been announced by the University. "Already in effect, freshman students are not now permitted to have autos in Carbondale. In each successive year, the restriction will be extended to the next advanced class until it applies to all students in the University. Another notable change to take effect in the fall, asks that upper-classmen park in areas which will not be immediately adjacent to their classroom buildings. Parking will probably be available for commuting students and physically handicapped upon approval of petitions submitted to the Office of Student Affairs. A bulletin telling of the parking reservations says the new policy of not allowing freshmen to have cars in Carbondale has been included in order "to free beginning students from distracting activities in their period of initial adjustment to the University," as well as to reduce the hazards brought about by heavy traffic around the campus. There are a few exceptions to the new regulations, such as married students, students over 21, and individual problems relating to outside employment involving transportation. All parking permits must be authorized through the Office of Student Affairs, Assistant Dean of Men Robert Edzinger said a new student may petition the regulation because of a special problem. If any parking regulations are not clear, explanations may be obtained from the Office of Student Affairs or the Campus Police.

Miss Betty Greenleaf Resigns

The resignation of Miss Elizabeth A. Greenleaf as coordinator of student activities at SIU was announced Monday.

She will accept a similar post at San Jose (Calif.) State College. The resignation will take effect September 1. Miss Greenleaf, an Indiana native, has held the position of Associate Dean of Students at San Jose State, a school of 40,000 enrollment. At San Jose, she will work similar to that she has done at SIU. She will work with the Panhellenic Council, the Associated Women Students, student government, and women students in general. Miss Greenleaf holds an A.B. degree in political science from DePaul University, and an M.A. also in political science, from the University of Wisconsin. She received her Ph.D. in political science and was an instructor. She taught in high schools in Indiana before getting her doctorate and has done extensive work with groups such as Girl Scouts. She recently had a research article on student leadership at SIU published in the Personnel Guidance Journal, and served last year as a convention recorder at the National Association of Women's Deans and Counselors convention. In December, she served on a panel at the Southern Personnel Guidance Meeting at Lexington, Ky., and served as consultant to the Regional Student Union Conference last winter. Miss Greenleaf expressed regret at leaving Southern, but explained that the post at San Jose was a professional opportunity she could not pass up.

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Nearly Half Summer Enrollees are Teachers

Nearly fifty per cent of the students enrolled at SIU for the summer session are high school teachers continuing their education, according to Registrar Robert A. McGrath. The enrollment has already set a new record for summer sessions at Southern, having come just past last year's mark of 2,886. At the end of the enrollment period, the figure should approach 3,100, McGrath said. Included in the summer enrollment of courses are a large number of workshops, short courses, and field courses.

Decision on Athletic Director 'Not Likely' for Week ... Grinnell

A final decision on the appointment of an athletic director at Southern "is not likely for a week or two", according to Dean John Grinnell. Grinnell told the Egyptian Monday that interviews with candidates for the post are still being conducted, and that a final decision would probably not be made until the 20th or 21st of July. The vacancy was created by the resignation of Carl E. Erickson, who accepted a similar post at Kent State, O., University. Grinnell, chairman of a committee named to recommend the new director, said last week the field had been narrowed to 4 or 6 candidates. Local names often mentioned in the race for the post are Donald Boulson, chairman of the SIU health education department, and "Doc" Langie, present SIU track coach. "Outsiders" who are reported to still be in the running for the post are Harlan Hodges, Ike Tomlinson, and Mel Brewer. Hodges is head basketball coach at the University of Idaho, and formerly was an assistant coach at SIU. Tomlinson is athletic director and head baseball coach at Arkansas State College, while Brewer is freshman football coach at the University of Illinois and an assistant to Athletic Director Douglas Mills.

William W. Heusner, Jr., swimming coach at Southern, has resigned to become head swimming coach and associate professor in physical education and athletics at the University of Minnesota.

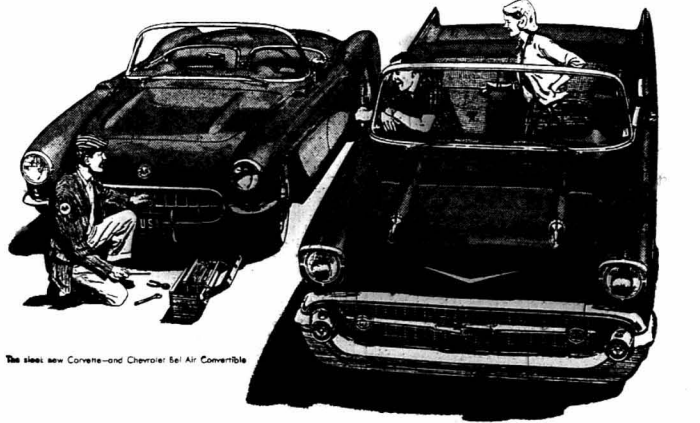
A surface exploration of the northern valley and surface and digging operations in the south a number of sections were held in the summer of 1955.
