Stasek Reminds Students With Overdue Loans

"Students with loans overdue must see me immediately," said Ernie D. Stasek, supervisor of scholarships and loans.

The students were listed in a recent issue of Air Force Times as being members of classes 57-J and 57-O-3C. A total of 454 student officers were listed to enter these classes.

Knee Bone Connected To... Museum, Anthropology Dept. Get 160 Skeletons

Skeletons — 160 of them — have been put on indefinite loan to the SIU Museum and Anthropology Department by the University of Chicago.
Some tools from Europe and Palestine, potters from the Illinois river valley and study collections from the Southwest and Southeast United States are included in the gift.
"Because of lack of room at the University of Chicago," said Dr. Howard Winters of the museum staff, "arrangements were made to distribute some of their material to other universities. We were fortunate in being granted some of the material."
The skeletons will be used for study in classes in physical anthropology and in research. Some will be put aside for students use in learning the bones of the body.
All of the skeletons, according to Winters, are modern. They are approximately 200-25 years old. They were assembled by Wilton Knogman, formerly with the University of Chicago and now at the University of Pennsylvania.
The pottery, collected from the Illinois river valley area, represents the late Indians, although some is 2,000 years old. The late pottery falls in the 700-year-old class.
Aside from the 25 whole pieces of pottery, there are various tools from excavations in Northern Illinois. This, as well as similar material from the Southwest and Southeast United States, are included in the gift.
Stone tools which date from 5,000 B. C. to as early as 500,000 B. C. are included in the collection from Europe and Palestine. Some of the earliest tools used by man are represented in the group.
Cradle hand axes, knives and various flint flakes that were used as knives and scrapers are included in the group.
From Iraq come microliths, tools which are very small knives and blades which are about the size of a finger nail. From Denmark there are polished stone axes, knives and spearheads.
Much of the material, according to Winters, will be used in museum exhibits, some within a month.

Magazine Cites Joint Illinois Alumni Council

The current issue of Public Relations Ideas cites the Joint Alumni Council of Illinois as an idea for consideration by institutions — or other states.
Representatives of SIU and other state-supported colleges and universities in Illinois, including the University of Illinois, compose the council.
Each institution has two delegates on the council. These delegates include the head of the college at that time, the president of the alumni association and the school president. The council meets annually.
Credited with creating a broad and understanding of the programs of member schools among alumni, the council also promotes recruitment for teacher education and gives guidance of legislative programs for member schools.
The council was first organized in 1944 for schools and programs in Illinois Teachers College Board.
Public Relations Ideas is a national bulletin sponsored by the public relations committee of the American Association of Colleges for Teacher Education.

The SIU wrestling team amassed 73 points Saturday to win the IAC wrestling meet at Charleston, taking 16 matches and losing only six. Northern Illinois took second with 42 points, closely followed by defending champion Illinois Normal with 40. It was the first time Southern had ever won the championship.

Capt. Paul Steingrub of Southern was voted the meet's outstanding wrestler, getting three pins. He pinned Jerry Thompson of Central Michigan in 1:32. Thompson had won over 40 consecutive matches until Saturday, and had never been pinned before in collegiate competition.

Five championships were won by Southern, plus two second place finishes and two fourths. All of the Saluki wrestlers got to the semifinals, while seven of nine made it to the finals. The victory was the most decisive in the last several years of the meet.

The Salukis, out to repeat their upset victory over the Leathernecks, jumped into an early 4-0 lead and kept ahead for the next 10 minutes, leading 23-20 with nine minutes left in the first half. But, the Westerners caught fire and poured in 17 points in the last few minutes while holding the Southerners to five, to make the score 37-23.

For the remainder of the half, SIU and Western played an even game and Western held a halftime advantage of 46-37.

Larry Whitlock was the spark plug in the first half as he hit five of his first six shots and tossed in three free throws.

The Salukis moved within striking distance of the leaders three times in the final period, but could never close the gap completely.

They rallied at the opening of the half, making it within three points, 48-45, falling back 60-49, then closing the margin to two points, 68-66, in eight minutes of play in the final period.

With three minutes remaining, the Southerners made the final bid, trailing only four points, 76-72. The Leathernecks could not be denied revenge, however, and came home with the win.
