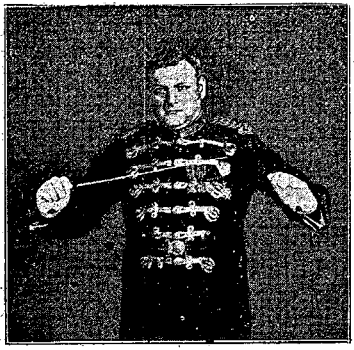

UNIVERSITY HIGH CLASS VISITS EXPERIMENTAL FIELD

About 30 members of the class in soils studies journeyed to Ewing in Franklin County on Thursday afternoon to see and study the effects of soil treatment shown on the various crops growing on the experimental field which is maintained by the Illinois Agricultural Experimental Station.

The farm consists of 40 acres which is divided into six series of 1/2 acre plots on which different methods of soil treatment are used annually on the six common crops grown in Southern Illinois—corn, soy beans, cotton, peas, wheat, clover, and alfalfa.

Careful records of yields are kept on each crop and the tests show conclusively which soil treatment pays best profits on soil such as prevails over 30 counties in Southern Illinois.

The trip was made in a truck. Mr. C. C. Logan was in charge of the group.

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
