PERMANENT YOUTH EMPLOYMENT BILL REACHES CONGRESS

WASHINGTON, D. C.—A bill to establish a permanent program to provide opportunities for employment and education for young people between 16 and 25 was introduced in Congress on January 12 by Representative Thomas A. Ansell (Prog.-Wis.) and Senator Elmer Benson (Farmer-Laborite) recently appointed by Governor Floyd Olson of Minnesota to fill the vacancy left by the death of Thomas S. Hall.

The American Youth Act was drafted by the National Council of the American Youth Congress, representing 50 youth organizations. It has received widespread support from many bodies, including the National Student Federation of America, the National Council of Methodist Youth, the American Student Union, the Rhode Island State Federation of Labor, many local trade unions, Y. M. C. A.'s and Y. W. C. A.'s.

Anticipating the end of the National Youth Administration which was authorized to exist only until June 30, the bill provides a permanent government set-up to give aid through work projects for unemployed youth, and through college projects to needy undergraduates and graduate students, and complete aid to students in high schools and vocational schools.

The secretary of labor and the United States commissioner of education are authorized to provide a system of vocational training and project employment for those out of work at prevailing wage rates in the United States. The bill provides \$15 per week plus \$2 for each dependent. Administration is vested in Youth Commissions, on which youth organizations, labor and educational experts shall be equally represented.

By living extension of the federal and vocational school projects is also provided. In college and universities, projects are to be administered in scope "in accordance with educational purposes of the institutions."

"The time has come," Senator Benson said, "when we ought to establish as a fundamental proposition that young people have an absolute right to useful employment and educational opportunities."

Three more PSA students have been added to the office force, making a total of 310 now employed. The principle of the work is lack of aid from the county groups here on the campus in checking over the list of alumni names collected.

Egyptian Grant of \$200 The Largest Announced Yet

Contributions and grants to the growing stadium funds continued to pour in during the week, as the various campus groups met and ascertained their respective donations. While most of the gifts are cash subscriptions, several of the organizations have pledged the benefits which they will obtain from the activities which they are sponsoring in the near future.

Personal tours, jubilees, and celebrations at which the king appeared all enhanced his personal popularity and made his death mourned throughout the empire.

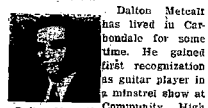

In September, 1929, Vincent DiGiovanna of New York City arrived in Carbondale to take up his duties as director of the physical education department.
