To Carbondale and Murphysboro, living in the memory of a catastrophe of like magnitude when tornadoes struck several years ago, the flood relief problem presented a means of 1e-

To the college, the flood meant simply another means of showing that this institution exists first of all for the people of Southern Illinois and that it will spare no effort in meeting their needs in normal conditions or in time of stress.

The college, students and faculty alike, are certainly to be commended for the way in which they threw their strength and resources into the breach at a time when aid was desperately needed by hundreds of homeless refugees from inundated

To the students in particular, the Egyptian wishes to express its sincere admiration. At any time that nearly two hundred students will give up time and energy at no return to themselves and for the benefit of people in whom many of them have no personal interest, the college and Southern Illinois in general have no cause to worry about the future of their youth.

Several times a year, tabloided headlines announce either death or serious injury to some pledge as a result of the informal initiation tactics of some fratarnal group. Especially is this true on many of the larger campuses where fraternities want to build up a reputation for being "big-time" and choose this means of accomplishing that end. As a result of these misfortunes, however, pressure has been brought to bear either from within or without chapter walls, restricting hazing to a unore popular indoor sport much milder in nature.

Luckily no serious accidents have occurred on the S. I. N. U.

ampus. Now the possibility of accidents has been reduced to negligibility by the recent intelligent legislation of the Intera negationity of the recent intension registation or the inter-praternity Council limiting the informal initiation period and restricting it on the whole-to the chapter house. The rule abol-ishing campus hazing, some lwa years back, coupled with the rules just framed are in harmony with movements by the large Eastern Universities advocating less rigid initiation ceremonies Broad-minded organizations have readily grasped the sanity of the proposal giving it a rapid and wide-spreading influence.

A timely comparison affords itself in noting the fact that on the identical date the S. I. N. U. Interfrat passed these regulations, the Interfraternity Council of the University of Illinois, representing some hundred odd fraternal groups, adopted an almost identical plan with the exception of the time element.
