A WARRANTED REBUFF-

The activities of the audience at Jerold Frederic's mano recita week ago last Tuesday were absolutely disgraceful; indeed, they should make anyone connected with the college blush for shame In the first place the crowd was noisy. Students and faculty mem bers talked whenever they felt like it, and that was frequently Not only was the audience blatant but there were sounds not conducive to enjoying fine music from the fover of the auditorium Strangely enough, the doors between the fover and the auditor ium propes were not closed. Right in the midst of a beautiful selection, the bell summoning people to their third period classes. rang out loud and long, and five minutes later, the same outrage Con ... occurred.

About midway in the concert people began walking out, not caring when or how much racket they made. When Mr. Frederic kindly consented to give an encore, people began to leave almost en masse. One would not have blamed Frederic if he had got un and thumbed his nose at everybody. All this would indicate that the concert was very poor, but

the fact is it wasn't at all. The consensus of opinion seems to be that this program was one of the most pleasing we have had here The only explanation then is that some of the people in the audience showed a flagrant lack of courtesy, no respect whatsoever for Mr. Frederic, and no capacity for musical enjoyment. Grade school children would have had sense enough to act better than these people did. They would at least have had enough house sense not to make a lot of noise so that other people could not enjoy the music even though they, themselves, did not understand or care for it. Now we are not quarreling here with those who do not like this type of music. We are not forcing fine music on anyone. But, if you don't care for it, for heavens' sake stay away from concerts rather than make everyone else miserable by your

The crowd showed a pitjable lack of appreciation but the blame does not rest wholly on their shoulders. The program was poorly managed, he ringing of the bells at the regular hours had two effects upon the audience. It gave those who were chafing to leave a chance to do so and render those who wanted to stay undecided about going to their classes, Frederic was given only the regular chanci time for an hour and fifteen minute concert. It an evening engagement had been arranged the undesirable people mentioned above would not have been present-and for this, one could only have fervently thanked the Lord.

This is not the first time an S. I. N. U. audience has disgraced itself and it is high time someone did something about it. K. C.

Class In Electricity Constructs Toaster

In their study of the conversion electrical energy into mechanical energy, L. C. Peterson's industrial arts class have constructed a toaster. This toaster, while it is both con-

It consists of five wire coils offering such a resistance to the electric current as to produce incadescence to give off the prolonged heating without undergoing noticeable deteriation.
