WRIGHT ADVOCATES PRESERVATION OF HISTORICAL SPOTS

Nomes Several Such Places In Rotary Speech
Employing the topic, "Interesting Places in Southern Illinois," John J. Wright of the History Agency...

DR. FOX ADDRESSES RE-ORGANIZED PRE-MED GROUP Will Take Place Of Sigma Phi Mu

At the first meeting of the recently organized group of pre-medical students on the S. J. N. U. campus Wednesday night, May 19, Dr. Ben Fox, local physician, spoke on the "History of Medicine."

About 25 students attended the gathering, held in the Parkinson Laboratory. The organization is under the guidance of Dr. Marie M. Heinrichs, College Physician, and was formed to bring about a closer relationship between the college pre-medical students and the Carbonate physicians.

Dr. Fox, junior, is acting secretary of the organization, Sigma Phi Mu, former pre-medical fraternity chapter on this campus, was disbanded earlier this year, and the new organization is the first indication of revived interest among the pre-medicals at S. J. N. U.

In his discussion, Dr. Fox discussed the contributions to medical practice of some of the earliest physicians including Galen, Vesalius, and Hygieia, all European physicians. He brought the discussion to a consideration of modern medicine, saying that the field was open to students and young doctors, with great advance yet to be made.

The organization is planning another meeting this year, with Dr. Heinrichs and Dr. William P. Fells, also of Carbonate speaking on the "Physiology and Pathology of the Heart," a discussion especially prepared for students who will enter medical schools next year. The students affiliated with the group are planning to maintain an active program throughout the next college year.

L. I. A. C. SPLIT MUST WAIT UNTIL DECEMBER Eight Freshmen Rule Colleges Petition Withdrawal

That the Illinois Interfraternity Athletic Conference will remain intact until December 3, 1937, at which time definite action may be taken by the conference at its regular winter meeting to be held in Chicago, was revealed at the spring meeting of the conference in Monmouth last Friday night.

Eight colleges presented announcements during the winter meeting of withdrawal from the I. A. C. They were: Lake Forest, Illinois College, Illinois Wesleyan, Bradley College, Wheaton, Augustana, Carthage, and James Millikin, all of whom entered or have recently adopted the freshman rule, which is the bone of most of the conflict.

It has previously been supposed that with this spring meeting, definite action concerning a permanent split would be taken. However, the rejoining schools were halted when Pres. V. F. Svaen, Bradley, referred to the constitution of the I. A. C.

Section 1 of Article 6 in the constitution reads as follows: "Any member wishing to withdraw from the conference must make a written application for such a privilege; the request shall be acted upon at the next regular meeting following the one at which it was presented. No member can legitimately withdraw until all his obligations to the conference has been completed."

The discussion of the split occupied the major part of the meeting. The only other event of importance was the changing of a minor eligibility rule.

MODERN S.I.N.U. MALE PREFERS CONSERVATISM By Willard Ker

"A pretty girl is just a melody..." Even the great Ziegfeld attributed much of his success to his glorification of the American girl. Perhaps the biggest reason for this was that when he was introduced to "since God could not be everywhere he made woman to take that place" (a fitting tribute to all that is fair and beautiful in womanhood).

What type of girl best represents the modern conception of feminine loveliness? The "flapper" flower represents the fastidious euphuism of an almost forgotten era. Second, that although "modernized" the man approves a temperate conservatism in the fair sex; that the "wild" college youth of the screen is not college youth in reality. A cross-section group of men voted on their preferences with the following results: the girls were roughly divided into four major types.

- 1. 12 per cent preferred the QUIET, DEMURE, and HIGHLY DISCIPLINED type.
2. The "NIGHT-CLUB QUEEN" type (a beautiful dancer) 10 per cent preferred this somewhat fancy type.
3. The FRIENDLY "AFFECTIONATE" type. 24 per cent expressed a preference for this type.
4. The MORE CONSERVATIVE type. (smokes little or none and dances only upon occasion), preferred by the majority—54 per cent. The first type could also be called "conservative" which would make the conservative preference 68 per cent.

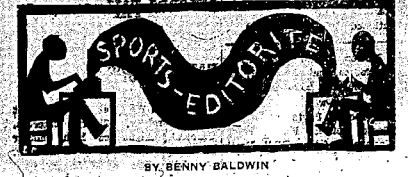
