Or better still could-one of the instigators not so anxious to withdraw have known of the rule but purposely failed to notify the others who probably didn't bother?

Anyway the Little 19 still remains the Little 19 and will do so until next December by which time the football sked will have been completed and part of the basketball card. #### Station S. I. N. U.

How would it be to have S. I. N. U. on the air? Why couldn' Southern have more prestige than she does have? With a radic station on the campus that would facilitate the broadcasting of extra-curricular activities, including football, basketball, public speaking events and debate, S. I. N. U. would be on the air at regular intervals during the day. It would also allow an outlet to ular intervals during the day. It would also allow an outlet to musical and dramatic falent of the student body. A radio station would employ, from the student body, several personnel worker and advertising solicitors. Within the school year, every person in the student body aspiring to broadcast work, and with actua ability as determined by auditions, would have a tryout before a microphone in a regular broadcasting program.

A broadcasting station would require only a limited space in the Parkinson laboratory or the new stadium. On a sustained profit-paying basis, the radio station would pay for itself within three or four years, 30 the while providing worthwhile employ. inell for soveral stidents, Students of radio phisics classes would have a proportionally to observe radio transmitter operation under ratio procedurating conditions. Also a class in broad-asting contribute to the proceduration of the contribute might be introduced.

It would add immeasurable prestige to the college, since only a few Normal schools possess their own radio facilities. Let's keep S. I. N. U. going on the present upward climb!


