HOW ABOUT A STILLENT LOUNGE?

With the passing of that old landmark, the University Cafe and the suggestion that students do not loaf on the Auditorium steps, the question of what students are to do in their spare time becomes increasingly important both to them and to the college

When one realizes that there are nearly fifteen hundred students on the campus and that several hundred of these are with out classes each hour, the problem of what they shall do and where they shall go shyingsly becomes one of paramount interest.

There now arises the question of what students want to do in their spare time. It is, of course, impossible for the majority of them to go to their rooming places during their free hours. Some of these students will want to study. For these comparaively few, there always remains the library as a study hall. onirse, the library isn't any tou quiet (largely the fault of the spunents), and it isn't a perfect place to study, but if you want to study, its not a bad place. That takes care of the true studants, a minority of the college population.

For the remainder of these students, what is there to do? For most of the ideal thing seems to be a place on or close to the campus where they can sit and talk to their friends, where they smoke, or where they can just sit and rest. For a limited number of this group, the various cafes near the earners answer this question. For a larger number, they do not. What, then can be done?

This question has been placed before the administrations of every college at some time or another. Some of them have answered it successfully, a few have made no answer, and others are still debating what can best be done. Apparently, our own college is in the latter group. Obviously, without knowing the available resources of this college no concrete suggestions can be made

However, one logical suggestion appears-that of the crestion of a student lounge. The place for such a lounge on an already over-crowded campus presents one difficulty. At present, only one available place presents itself. This is the basement of Wheeler Library, not a perfect place from any standpoint, to be sure, but at least located on the campus and reasonably conven iently located to all students. Soundproofing of the ceiling would make it virtually isolated from the study rooms. To make the basement usable, improvements in decorations, fixtures, and light ing would be necessary.
