Visiting tennis teams and visitors from other schools have for some time commented on the inadequacy and poor quality of tennis equipment here.

#### CURRICULUM REVISION COMMITTEE SIGNALIZES S. I. T. C. PROGRESS

Recognizing the fact that progress is accompanied by change, President Pulliam has selected a faculty committee to consider the revision of the curriculum at S. J. T. C. The need of such action is conspicuous; the manner in which the committee is going about meeting that need is admirable

In his suggestions at the inception of the committee's activity, Mr. Pulliam emphasized the necessity of working with the view of a fundamental reorganization in mind rather than "immediately expedient tinkering."

We conside this suggestion the most pertinent and far-reaching advice that could be given a newly-appointed committee whose action is to have a tremendous influence on the future of this college.

An encouraging feature is the serious attitude the members of the committee are taking toward the situation, and the close adherence they are making to Mr. Pulliam's advice. With Professor F. G. Warren as chairmen, the committee is headed by a man who has spent twenty-three years on the feculty of S. I. T. C., during which time he has a trigide agraphily, the adjustical ime he has studied carefully the educationa

time he has studied carefully the educational trends in colleges. Probably the most conspicuous trend in teachers' colleges is the tendency to place greater emphasis on the four year course. With this in mind, the committee will certainly not encourage any development in the two year course, but will look toward a gradual elimination of it.

The three-fold plan of action outlined at the first meeting of the committee last week is indicative of the thought the subject is receiving. The committee intends first to collect specific data on the local situation; second, to draw up a tentative philosophy upon which to base procedure; third, to analyze the problem and at-

a tentative philosophy upon which to base pro-cedure; third, to analyze the problem and at-tempt a solution of it. Study resulting in action is the thesis of its program.

As student of S. I. T. C., we certainly should be concerned with such a project and should have some opinions and ideas on what we think the outcome of a curriculum reorganization should be. Since members of the committee have indicated that they are anyious to learn our should be.
