Richman said earlier that if there is collusion or price fixing on the part of the drycleaning businesses, the state could file either criminal or civil the action against concerns involved.


GermanOfficial To Visit SIU

SIU Faculty Salary Schedule Moves Up, **AUP** Shows Study

SIU's faculty salary scale has moved one notch up in the 1966-67 academic year from the previous year, according to the annual AAUP (American Association of University Professors) survey. The improvement is in the

minimum compensation scale, which moved up from a D rating to a C rating. In the average compensation scale, South-ern's C rating remained unchanged.

The AAUP report last year did not list SIU among the universities rating better than C in both average and minimum scales. The list, however, did include the other Illinois state universities.

According to the June issue of the AAUP Bulletin, SIUlast year was one of 275 colleges and universities in the nation that paid \$10,000 or more in average salaries. The survey was based on 862 institutions that reported. Institutions which improved

the minimum scale from D to C, as SIU, numbered 98.

The survey assigns letter grades of seven categories--AA and A through F--for each academic rank and for both compensation and average minimum compensation.

In 1966-67, for example, the AA rating in average compensation for full professor was \$24,510, and AA in minimum compensation for the same rank \$17,220. The F rating for the same rank was \$7,430 and \$6,520 in the respective categories.

Despite its improvement, SIU still trails two Illinois state universities in overall ratings. Southern is behind the University of Illinois in aver-age compensation (U. of I. received a B rating) and behind Northern Illinois in minimum compensation (B). U. of I. received Bs for all

four ranks (three professorial ranks and instructor) whereas SIU received a C for full pro-fessor and Bs for the rest. Although the ratings for four

ranks are identical for all the regional universities -- Eastern, Northern, Western, Southern and Illinois State--Northern has an edge over the rest in the overall minimum scale.

The survey makes a distinction between compensation and salary, the former including remuneration above the bare salary. Such a difference exists for all the Illinois uni-

versities, except Illinois State and Western where the two figures are identical.

The average compensation for all ranks at the six Illinois universities are: The University of Illinois--

\$12,132.

- Southern--\$10,591. Eastern--\$10,504. Northern--\$10,390.
- Illinois State--\$10,255.

Western--\$10,044. The nation's leader in average compensation is still Har-vard University which pays

\$18,700. The remainder of the top five are the University of Chicago (\$17,376), Parsons College (\$17,268), Stanford University (\$16,947) and Cal-ifornia Institute of Technology (\$16.487).

The overall average compensation at 862 reporting in-stitutions was \$11,289, aver-age salary \$10,387.

age salary \$10,387. The average salary at SIU was \$10,347 in 1966-67 (\$9,-824 in '65-'66) and averave compensation \$10,591 in '66-'67 (\$10,018 in '65-'66).

1.650 SIU Student Loans Approved

Federal funds for loans to ,650 SIU students have been approved by the U.S. Bureau of Higher Education, accord-ing to Rep. Kenneth J. Gray, D-West Frankfort.

Gray said the funds, amounting to \$570,462, were made available under Title 2 of the National Defense Edfunds, ucation Act. SIU will provide 10 per

cent matching funds.





NEW YORK (AP)-Stokely Carmichael of the Student Nonviolent CoordinatingCommittee "arrived in Hanoi Fri-day," SNCC Chairman H. Rap day, Brown announced today.

Brown made the announcement at a crowded news con-ference at the Church center for the United Nations, managed by the Methodist Church, opposite U.N. headquarters.

"Mr. Carmichael is in the Democratic Republic of Viet-nam to investigate and see for himself the savage aggression being carried out against that country by the United States, "said a statement that Brown read and distributed.

"Previous investigators of ours who visited the country have reported that the United States is experimenting with weapons there that would be

LBJ Reports Lull Viet Combat

WASHINGTON (AP) ident Johnson said Friday the Communist foe in South Vietnam, "because of the losses he has suffered," appears less anxious now to engage Ameri-

can forces in ground combat. Assessing the Vietnam sit-uation at a White House news conference, Johnson said there has been a lull in both air

has been a lull in both air and ground activity, but he said this does not include any chance in U.S. policy. "So far as this government is concerned, our policy has not changed," Johnson said. "We are here to deter ag-gression."

At the same time, Johnson said South Vietnam is progressing toward representative government in an election campaign which has been cri-ticized as unfair by some U.S. senators. "It is remarkable that a

young country fighting a tough war on its own soil has moved so far toward a representative government," he said. Critical senators, among

them Sens. Robert F. Kennedy, D-N.Y., and Jacob K. Javits, R-N.Y., have accused the cur-rent Vietnamese government rent Vietnamese government of interfering with the cam-paign progress and thus un-dermining the opportunity for a fair election. Voting is scheduled for Sept. 3.

scheduled for Sept. 3. Discussing the war situation itself, Johnson said there has been some lull in air activity because of weather and be-cause the men in charge felt it was necessary "to restrain" themselves and not carry out carting targets multiple to certain targets available to them." He did not explain the latter comment.

Ground activity, he said, is largely determined by the Communist enemy himself. the

"More and more here of late we think because of the losses he has suffered...he is less anxious to engage our troops in combat,"Johnson caid said. Asked about his domestic

measures, Johnson said about 100 domestic bills were pro-

posed and about half have been passed.

He said he is happy about the House's action Thursday on Social Security-although he said some matters were brought in that he had not recommended and some re-ductions made. He did not
