## GENERAL INFORMATION

Fees for the summer session total \$11.25 for all who sign the agreement to teach. For others they are \$16.67. These fees, set by the Teachers College Board, are uniform for all State teachers colleges in Illinois. No special charges are made for the library or gymnasium. Each student is entitled to the Egyptian, issued weekly during the summer session as well as in the regular school year. Each student also receives at the time of registration a ticket to the Entertainment course. The attractions are not yet announced, but will include some good talent in music and dramatics. At least one well known lecturer in the educational field will be presented.

A new feature of the summer session will be a three-day conference for teachers and school administrators which will be held at the college beginning on Wednesday, June 17. A program of lectures and group discussions, which will be open to anyone who is interested in education whether he is registered as a student in the summer session or not, will be provided. An added feature of this conference will be an educational exhibit by the publishing companies of books and other materials of interest to teachers. Detailed plans for this conference will be announced later.

Anthony Hall is the only dormitory. Women may secure board and room for \$6.00 a week. Anyone interested should write



to Miss Sara Baker, Head of the Hall, and make a deposit of \$5.00 to reserve a room.

Admission to the summer session is limited to graduates of accredited high schools and to those mature teachers whose experience entitles them to admission without high school graduation. The latter, however, will be admitted as unclassified students. Any student contemplating matriculation should have a transcript of his previous scholastic record sent to the Registrar before he comes.

While the announcement of courses for the 1936 Summer Session may not be taken as final, most of the subjects will be given as scheduled. All subjects are offered as four quarter hour courses, the equivalent of the term credit of the regular twelve-week terms. The classes are scheduled to meet five times a week, and the periods are 60 minutes in length. The normal student load will be three courses, or twelve quarter hours for the session. The summer school day is divided into five periods and an assembly hour, as follows:

1st hour—7:05-8:05

2nd hour—8:10-9:10

Assembly—9:15-9:45

3rd hour— 9:50-10:50

4th hour—10:55-11:55

5th hour—12:00- 1:00

Courses numbered 100-199 are primarily for freshmen; 200-299 are for sophomores; and 300 and above are for juniors and seniors.
