## Western Ill., Cape Here; Maroons To Evansville

A busy week is in store for the Maroons as they prepare to take the first step in defense of their Illinois Intercollegiate Athletic Conference crown tomorrow night against Western Illinois Teachers, and then step out of loop play to entertain Southeastern Missouri State on Tuesday and travel to Evansville to return the Hoosier's visit on Thursday.

Southern, who won the IAC crown for the first time last year, will be out to lengthen their skein of victories over the Leathernecks which started in 1943.

The "Junior Whiz Kids" have come away victorious in the last seven meetings, Macomb winning last on January 22, 1943.

Although the Westerners are not rated too highly on any of the polls, they hold the Southern rivalry in esteem, especially since the Maroons knocked them off during the grid season in the Macomb Homecoming game.

Coach Lynn Holder's charges have something else to protect, as they have run their home game streak to the extent of having lost only one home game in approximately two and one-half seasons. This game was taken by the Wright Field Kingbirds last year.

So far this season, the Maroons have won seven and lost four. Their victims have been Chelford Manufacturing, Ontario, Cleveland Washington University, Arkansas State, Indiana State, Colorado Aggies, and Evansville College, while they have been defeated by St. Louis University, Western Kentucky, Loyola of New Orleans, and Rockhurst of Kansas City.

The Western affair will get under way at 8:15, the preliminary to start at 7 p. m. Tickets will be sold on a first-come, first-served basis to the athletic department here.

## Sphinx, Forerunner of the Obelisk, Made Debut at Turn of Century

Hi, hi, hi, he, he, he, M. D. C. C. Algebra, Pedagogy, Lightning, Thunder, Century, 1900.

Perhaps similar to the modern jingles like "Mairzy Doats and Chickery Chick" the above ditty is merely a class yell for the junior students of 1900 at Southern Illinois Normal University, which appeared in a publication known as "The Sphinx" 47 years ago.

Composed of "bright, intelligent, good looking members," quoting their opinion of themselves, the junior class made the first attempt to compile a year's events at Southern into a publication, which is known today as the "Obelisk."

"Knowing that the readers of this book are fond of wrestling with abstruse problems," they christened it "The Sphinx," and dedicated it to Daniel B. Parkinson, "honored president, loved and inspiring teacher."

The first few pages of "The Sphinx" were devoted to pictures and short biographies of each of the 18 faculty members. Henry W. Shreckley who later became president of the University, was at that time faculty orator, having come to SINU in 1893 in "chair of literature and elocution."

In those days faculty members must have been held in high esteem by the "Sphinx" staff since a rhymed verse was composed about each one of them. A typical example is the following: And there is another, the youngest of the bunch. We would not give him up if you took all the rest; He knows mathematics without a doubt, It's Professor Alvis we speak about. Football was apparently the only sport back in the "good old days," and the '98 team composed of 12 players, of coach, and a manager, posed for "The Sphinx" 47 years ago.

Sparked by Oliver Shoff, high scoring Maroon forward, Southern gained their seventh win of the present season with a 52-41 conquest of the Evansville College Aces last Tuesday night on Southern's home floor. Coach Lynn-Holder's five remain undefeated on their own hardwood.

Ringing in the circus, Shoff topped Quintin Stinson's 12 markers to gain individual scoring honors for the night. Bob Colburn and Gene Hall gave the Maroon quintet rebounding power. John Sebastian and Shoff at forwards, Stinson in the pivot slot and Colburn and Hall at guards took up the initial chores for Southern.

Both teams were slow to get started and it wasn't until two minutes of play had elapsed that Shoff connected with the hoop to give Southern a 2-0 lead. Stinson immediately followed with a counter. With the score 7-5, the Aces scored three points and threatened the Maroon lead. Stinson quickly reencountered with three for Southern and the Holdermen held a four point lead, 10-5. Shoff dropped in Southern's next five points, and the Aces again made designs on the lead with two gift shots and three field goals to make the score 15-14. Colburn, Stinson, and Shoff continued their scoring efforts to pull Southern out of this hole. From this point on the local quintet controlled the play in the first period and as the half ended held a 27-22 lead.

As they had in the first half, Southern controlled the heavy end of the score throughout the entire second period. Southern had trouble in finding the hoop with their shots and were only four points ahead in most of the final period. With the score 47-41, Shoff, Goss, Stinson, and Hall controlled the scoring in the final minutes and Southern finished the game on the heavy end of a 52-41 score.

The hockey season ended with the crown going to the Southern Flyers. Close runners-up were the Goal Getters and the Little Atoms who were tied for second place. Fifty-seven women participated in this sport, which was under the direction of Angelina Ferrari.

The badminton tournament ended last night with a final victory for Mary and Helen Gresham and Marie Kern in the advanced group, and Helen Gresham and Mary Young in the beginners.
