CLINTON, ISS 171, (L) No. 457, of Fleet Post Office, New York, New York: "We Navy men are lucky to be able to write to the boys in the Marine Corps or Army or Air Corps. This little slip makes a fairly beautiful and comfortable home. We all have a good bed to sleep in every night, although a fellow may have rolled and tossed around and been thrown this way and that during the night. We have the pleasure of eating our meals hot and not from a tin can where we can sit down, although a person may reach out for something and look up to suddenly find his shirt pinned out of reach and halfway down the table. As those coming over I had to hold my food on the table with one hand and eat with the other—a slight rocking of the ship, as you can imagine. We have a nice dry place to keep our possessions. And time I ever want to go any place I have everything that I have to wear right along with me on the ship—right convenient."

It all sounds swell, Jimmy, but if you hear from these members of the Army or Marine Corps (who think their outfit is great stuff, don't blame me), May your good fortune continue. WALTER W. PRICE, 4777 07 Trucking Company, Fort Ord, California: "I have been receiving the EGYPTIAN and I try to read every word. The paper is one of the many links with the past. I have the same old days and nights. School, football, movies, books, studies, and other activities. How far away they seem and how much has gone since then. How the sands of life have sifted down. The sifting sands...."

Some things are necessary to carve your niche in the outer world. And then, WAR!

The world changes, and you change. And yet life goes on. You must now become an individual of the team; you must coordinate your efforts. You must realize that the people at home are having their own problems and that you must be prepared to take care of the past and look to the future. You wonder of the changing sands, of the changing conditions, and of the changing opportunities. Yes, the sands shift...."

Solidarity expressed, Walter! ... But just wait, my lad, until you've seen the shifting sands of the Mojave—see YUKI'S, the FPC, ROBERT V. LILLY, 425 16th Company "C," ASTP 2318, Berkeley, California. "The course here is quite different. It's a learning experience which is based upon your ability to be the most efficient of the officers and men. See how they are prepared. You think you're a little bit of a leader, but you're not. You have to be more than a mere leader; you have to be a leader and in a general sort of way talk about the weather. The only saving feature is that it is written in European characters...."

The University of California is quite big so big in fact that it is a fifteen minute walk between the farthest extremes. The students are mostly girls, soldiers, and civilians in that order. We are housed in fraternity houses, and the life is very far removed from camp conditions. We get only a little free time, but that is made up for by the extra in which we may receive passes. San Francisco is only about a half hour's ride away so that is our objective on weekends...."

Most of the students here are from Eastern schools such as Yale, Princeton, Harvard, and Columbia. There are even one or two from Oxford, as far as I know there is no one from SOUTHERN here, although I have heard that there are some students in Stanford...."

The EGYPTIAN has been coming regularly and I was glad to know that the question of the contents of Old Man has finally been settled. I know just how the students felt about it since I remember for the other fellows I used to receive to drink from the existing ones. Our instructors in Annamore are the natives of French Indochina who are knowledgeable in English is quite limited. When we need explanation of one of the finer points they explain in French which is not so hard to understand as you may think. The French makes it rather difficult to understand, but we usually make out quite well. There is a phonetician attached to our class who tells us how to make the sounds, but who does not know or speak much French, so we have to invent our own in the existing ones...."

Ever since the Creole patois fell upon our ears in early childhood, we've been fascinated by foreign languages. Allen Annamore, however, is one we haven't investigated, but it certainly sounds interesting.... Have fun in France, boy!

NEWS FROM EVERYWHERE

LOS ANGELES—"A new united Russia, based on national interests different from either Soviet or Soviet Russia, is emerging," declares Dr. Robert J. Kerner, professor of history on the Berkeley campus of the University of California.

The second world war has decisively confirmed the trend of the Soviet Union away from an internationally directed communist ideology of world revolution.

To avoid isolation in which her security would be menaced, the Soviet Union stands for a hard and fast alliance with the United States and the British Commonwealth of Nations, and China, as a nucleus around which an effective new international organization should be built.

DETROIT, Mich.—Women dentists, as scarce now as women waiters were before Pearl Harbor, will appear in the future in even-increasing numbers.

Professor Creaser points out that more than 1,000 dentists now practicing in Detroit, only 12 are women, and that throughout the country there are 35 men in the profession for every woman.

"The skill which women in industries are displaying in the manipulation of small tools," said Professor Creaser, "gives ample evidence of their aptitude for at least one phase of dental work. Furthermore, we know that the few women who have entered the profession have proved exceptionally successful, particularly in the fields of children's dentistry and orthodontia."

Dr. Creaser also emphasized the existing need for Negro dentists, both male and female, and quoted Dr. M. Don Clawson, director of dental education at the city's medical college, Flat university as saying that there are only 2,000 Negro dentists, very few of them women, serving the 12,000,000 Negroes in the United States.

PERSONALLY invited at Mexico City by Diana G. P. Hammond of the University of New Mexico Graduate School on a trip there early in January, the five professors will be on the commencement platform with 130 graduating seniors and 25 who are admitted to receive the master's degree.

The men to receive the honorary degrees are Licenciado Roberto Brito Foucher, president of the National University, who will be given the degree of doctor of laws; Jaime Torres Bodet, Mexico's minister of public education, doctor of letters; Alfonso Casto, director of the National Institute of Anthropology and History, doctor of letters; and Francisco Villagrán Prado, dean of the baccalaureate college of the National University, doctor of laws.

Arrangements for the ceremonies are being completed by the university with the assistance from the United States embassy at Mexico City.
