The Artist

A Social Development

If we accept the premise that the category "artist" includes more than just the people who are involved in and devoted to the production of artifacts, and that all people who are involved in the production of artifacts are not necessarily artists, then it becomes extremely difficult to distinguish "the artist" from the people at large.

People of the artist category pervade the whole of society. Yet, so many of us, when we see a producing artist, behave like city children on the first visit to an art museum. We have the "gee! Mommie look! A real cow!" a city child may say pointing at a nude.

Clauded Relationship
We have clouded the real relationship between the artist, artifact, and audience by an aura of sensationalism. We have set the artist off in another realm. And yet, there are few people who deal more closely with the problems basic to the human situation. For me to attempt to solve the complex problems of the social function of art would be a far greater task than I would attempt now. I can however, point to what seems to be the most important considerations.

It is extremely important that we realize that the production of artifacts is a leisure time activity. By this we mean that it is a step removed from the struggle for survival which is the primary function of society. A survey of the world cultures would prove that the production of artifacts increases proportionately in quality and quantity to the wealth or security of that culture.

Two Aspects
I have mentioned the "real relationship" between the artist and audience. There are two vitally important aspects to this relationship. First, the artist depends on the people and the world around him for the impression that he would convey in his art. The second point was stated quite precisely by the great American poet Walt Whitman, who said, "We have great poets (artists), we must have great audiences too."

Of course there are many other factors that influence the relationship at any given time. Both the artist, and the artifact, as well as the audience, serve and are served by such pressures as religion, politics, morality, and truth. Another pressure that is

Thoroughbreds

They're Off And Running

Tense spectators crush each other against the railing and crane their necks to watch the starter. In the clubhouse, binoculars focus on the track. "They're off!"

Every year, over 30 million Americans cheer Thoroughbreds around the country's 77 racetracks making horse racing the nation's leading spectator sport. Organized racing in this country goes back to 1665 when the first track was laid out in Long Island, New York.

Last Records:
All records of the real origin of the Thoroughbred horse have been lost prior to the year 1686. It was then that the stallion Byerly Turk was brought to England.

Darley Arabian, arrived in the British Isles a little later. And in 1726, the Earl of Godolphin acquired possession of another great stallion, supposedly found pulling a watercart in Flanders.

Every Thoroughbred in the world today descended from one of this royal trio... Byerly Turk, Darley Arabian and Godolphin Barb.

The breeding industry was not long in developing into big business in this country... when Buller Rock, our first Thoroughbred of record was imported from England about 1730.

Covers Large Area
Today our breeding farms cover a total area three times the size of Rhode Island... and the value of their stock is estimated at 65 million dollars!

One of the greatest achievements of any horse, either in England or the United States, is to emerge the winner of the Triple crown.

Here the races comprise the Kentucky Derby, the Preakness Stakes and the Belmont Stakes.

The hullabaloo and excitement which surrounds these major sporting events was climaxed on October 24, 1877, when Congress adjourned to see the races at Pimlico.

Only eight Thoroughbreds have attained the Triple Crown in the history of American racing... among them the noted Citation.

The romance and color of the racing world is exemplified in the story of the Atlantic City Race Course, the big modern brick clubhouse-grandstand of which sits at the junction of US Route 40 and the Black Horse Pike just four-

Indiana Firm Furnishes Feed

An Indiana pharmaceutical firm will furnish a supply of feed hormone materials to help conduct a new dairy heifer feeding research project at the SIU School of Agriculture.

Dr. Alex Reed, chairman of the SIU animal industries department said today the Eli Lilly and Company research office at Greenfield, Ind., will provide a needed supply of "Silbool," the firm's trade name for diethylstilbestrol, a growth stimulating hormone sometimes used in livestock feeding.

The object of the SIU research project will be to determine the effect of the hormone on heifer growth and reproductive development. Gerald Kravczyk, Murphysboro, a June graduate who has been in the SIU research laboratory in fellowship to work on his master's degree in animal industries at SIU, will conduct the research under the supervision of Dr. Howard H. Olson, SIU dairy specialist.

Holman Attends National Meet In Wisconsin

Clifton T. Holman, faculty station director of WSU, Southern's FM radio station, recently attended the National Association of Educational Broadcasters Seminar in Madison, Wis.

The University of Wisconsin sponsored the 78 July through 25 conference of 31 station managers from coast-to-coast. The purpose of the seminar was to start a live coast-to-coast educational network.

It was decided to set up such network at the earliest possible time. Meanwhile the NAEB would form regional networks which would be joined later.

Other Schools
Wisconsin has its own FM network, which includes 10 stations, and has been operating for 10 years, with the University station as the operating center. Ohio and Michigan have similar operations. Holman said that a regional network on the East coast, from Montreal to North Carolina, will start operating in September. "We are exploring the possibility of a regional network in this area," said Holman.

"Sixty of us met and agreed it was a good idea, and said now let's see if it can be done," Holman explained. WGBH Lowell Institute, in Boston is pushing the Eastern network. Holman thought that a number of questions would be answered at the NAEB national convention at San Francisco in October.

Holman replaced Ralph E. Becker, June 16, as faculty station manager, and Becker replaced Joseph Ripley, associate director of the SU Broadcasting Service. Ripley is taking a leave of ab-

It was believed that he would enroll at St. Louis University, but the Belleville athlete told Glenn "Abe" Martin, Southern's baseball coach, last weekend that SIU was his choice.

Coach Martin and Harry Galatin, SIU's basketball mentor, are equally overjoyed at Mel's decision. In coming to Southern, Mel will probably play baseball with his brother Larry, who is a catcher on Martin's squad.

Mel graduated from Belleville High School this year. He was on Southern's campus last May 14 to watch the SIU-Northern Illinois University baseball doubleheader. At that time he told Galatin that he would probably come to Southern if he didn't sign with a professional baseball team.

He averaged over 31 points a game during the basketball campaign and his baseball endeavor produced a .500-plus batting average. Twice this year he hit home runs that went over the Belleville centerfield fence, which is a 290-foot poke.
