# INFESTINAL FORTITUDE

Earlier this week the campus was shaken from its lethargy by the news that a senior student at Southern charged the acting administration of "misadministration" and urged Governor Dwight H. Green to make the appointment of a new president. Because Mrs. Lola Davis has spoken specifically, the way has been cleared for the Egyptian to speak as a student newspaper.

- The following charges were made by Mrs. Davis:
- Personal prejudice used in administration:
    - Suggested dismissal of faculty members because of anti-administration tendencies without basis of scholastic or professional standing. (Five Department Heads have such letters in their possession.)
    - Hiring of a personal friend after requesting dismissal of others on the ground that the present emolument did not require them.
    - Raising salaries of 14 on the faculty after the Professors had already received promotions for the year, with the result that unless a new appropriation is made funds will not be sufficient for the biennium.
    - Raising the salary of a personal friend on the grounds of "merit work" above that which the State Normal Board would allow on his professional standing.
  - Reduction of budgets of important departments:
    - Art.
    - English.
    - Child Guidance.
  - Lack of directive ability hampering program of University:
    - Committee on Reorganization for the three Colleges has not acted since death of Mr. Pulliam.
    - Curriculum Committee unable to move. (Acting President when asked said he did not know what the duties of the committee were.)
    - Discontinued Adult Education Committee of the University, his hampers outreach of the University.
    - Three colleges are now operating with no functioning heads and no official action of requirements.
  - Curtailment of Guidance Bureau:
    - Cooperation of University limited with respect to former cooperation with Department of Public Welfare, because of reduced budget.
    - Prestige and service of University reduced since the staff and budget are reduced.
    - Bureau unable to cooperate with University High School in testing program, because of cut in budget.
  - Veterans Rehabilitation:
    - Untrained person in charge.
    - Ignored existing facilities of the University for dealing with veterans.

The Acting President, Dr. Bruce W. Merwin made no statement denying the charges which were reprinted in condensed form in several Southern Illinois papers and the Chicago Daily News. Dr. Merwin did say, however, that he would "welcome the opportunity to answer them" when he received the communication from the Governor in which Mrs. Davis made the charges, and "I assume that since the charges are so serious that Governor Green and the Teachers' College Boards will seek to investigate them."

Certainly "the situation" is of the greatest concern to the entire student body, faculty and Southern Illinois in general. Therefore, as a student newspaper, we ask: Why has the Board procrastinated for eight months? Why hasn't at least a statement been issued by the Board. Is there any substance to the charges made by Mrs. Davis? If these charges go unanswerd it is only logical to assume that there are some grounds for the charges.

In any event we urge the Governor to act in selecting a president who is academically qualified and who has the educational interests preeminent over political interests. It is your duty as student, to inform your parents of the recent charges, and urge them to write the Board members and the Governor demanding immediate action on the presidential situation.

# THE SITUATION

Twice recently, the Egyptian has been mentioned in the local and metropolitan press that the paper has been put under strict censorship by the administration. We feel that for the benefit of the general public of Southern Illinois, we should make our position clear.

First, a little background material is needed. Since the death last spring of our late President, Mr. Roscoe Pulliam, and the following appointment of Mr. Bruce W. Merwin as Acting President, the Normal School Board has delayed the appointment of a permanent president for eight months. Meanwhile, there has been a growing unrest all over the state accompanied by a barrage of rumors which contain a varying degree of verity. The largest of these rumors have generally stated one of three things; that the school board is putting off the selection of a president with hopes of amputating Dr. Merwin's "pro tem," that the school board is under the influence of up-state forces who hope to ruin forever the chances of improvement of S. I. N. U., or the procrastination is due to the use of too much politics by the school board and the candidates. At any rate, the school board has not made an appointment, nor has it issued any statement concerning the reason for the delay. The board undoubtedly has its reasons, but the people feel that they should be released for information.

Now let us see how all this concerns the Egyptian. First of all, there has been a misuse of terms. The Egyptian has never been "censored" in the sense that all copy is read before publication; but the staff has been "censored", not by the administration alone, but by students, faculty, and many other groups. The words "censor" and "censura" have too often been used homonymously as they should never be. For reasons of discretion the Egyptian staff has chosen to print very little on certain issues that have come up in which the student newspaper would have a strong voice. Thus the Egyptian has been heard in its silence. But there have been complaints about the small amount of material printed and there have been complaints about what has not been printed.

The administration has, on several occasions, expressed bewilderment at the charge that the Egyptian has been censored, and it is the wish of the Egyptian staff that their bewilderment be justified.

## STUDENT OPINION POLL

STUDENTS UNINFORMED ABOUT NEW LEAGUE OF NATIONS

The results of the questionnaire passed out in chapel last Tuesday concerning the new "League of Nations" called "The United Nations," proved conclusively that students were uninformed and indifferent to the Dumbarton Oaks proposal.

Of the 200 blanks returned, a small minority marked Dumbarton Oaks the correct answer to the multiple choice question. "The most recent proposal for a League of Nations" was formulated at which one of the following places? Chicago, Dumbarton Oaks, Quebec, Bretton Wood, or Yalta.

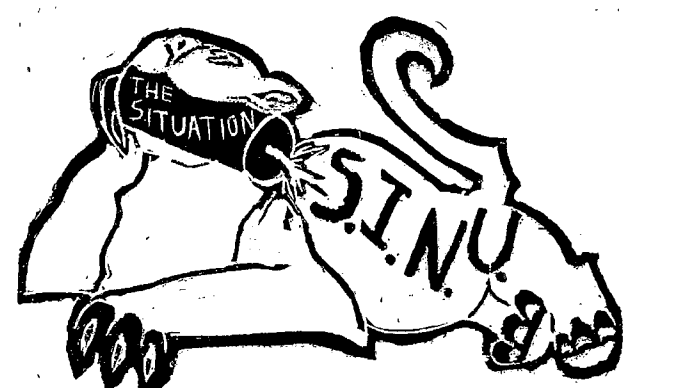
To the second question, "The tentative proposal called 'The United Nations' advocated which of the following: A. An international police force. B. Immediate execution of Hitler. C. Personal settlement without use of force. Most of the students answered correctly by marking "an international police force."

The third question which concerned the makeup of "The United Nations" more than half of the students divided their answers between the two incorrect statements. In fact the Security Council composed of the four big powers was the only governing agency, and it is the General Assembly composed of all peace-loving nations was the only executive agency. The correct answer is that the Security Council is composed of six permanent and six non-permanent members and a general assembly.

The comparison table proposed, "The United Nations" is a tentative plan designed to maintain peace and security in the post-war world. The general outlines of the new "League" are shown elsewhere on the editorial page. As set up at present the power will lie in the hands of an international Security Council dominated by the five permanent members of the United States, France, Great Britain, China and eventually France.

In addition, there will be six "non-permanent" members. They will be elected by the General Assembly, in which all peace-loving nations will have representation. There will also be an international Council of Justice and a Secretariat.

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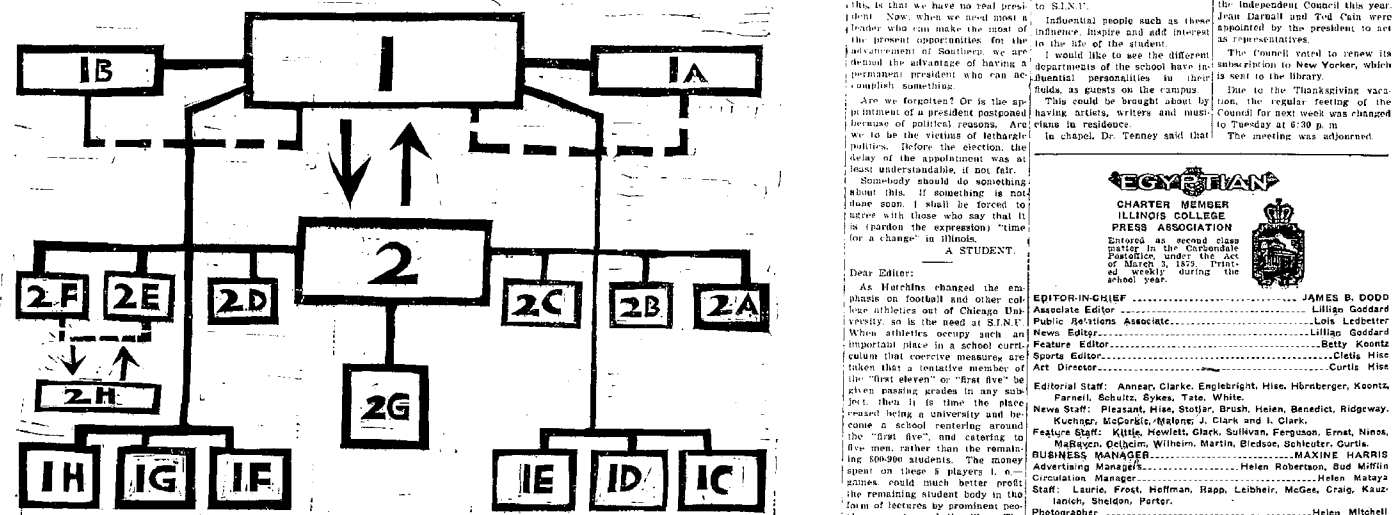

MISS MAVER TELLS OF EXPERIENCES IN GERMANY AND FLIGHT TO U. S.

By JEAN CLARK. Lola Mayer, a Traveling Student of the World Student Service Fund, is a native of Germany where she experienced the difficulties of youth under the Nazi regime...

From 1933 to 1934, she shared the same conditions with thousands of other young people. Her first-hand knowledge of what students are feeling in Europe...

"Conditions grew worse and worse," Miss Mayer explained. "At first I became almost unrecognizable. I lost everything except my father who was a prominent lawyer...

"After Mr. Mayer's release from the bread rack, he and his family fled to England, their haven of safety. They fled to America where they were there. Miss Mayer left her part along the Channel as a nurse, cheering and helping wherever she could...

"I could have stayed in England forever," Miss Mayer said. "But we knew we could never be allowed working permits in America. I always dreamed of going to America if I ever left Germany...

"I heard and read a lot about America," Miss Mayer said. "So I wanted to see it. I went to Washington D. C. and visited Lincoln's Memorial. I was deeply touched, and I'll never forget it."

"The Mayer family made its way to Seattle, Washington, and it was quite an experience to arrive four days over forty nights, with no money, no food, and no clothes."

"The Mayer family was determined to go to Seattle, Washington," Miss Mayer recalled. "Because although it was a hard time, it was the only way to see the world. In the afternoon Seattle was wonderful—there was no place like it."

"Miss Mayer's service in the United States Army was a very interesting experience. She was a member of the Girl Scout troop and worked in connection with a children's court."

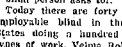
