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## Sigma Betas Edge K.D.A. In Track Meet Thursday

Sigma Beta Beta came from behind to take top honors in the 100-yard dash at the inter-fraternity track meet held here Thursday afternoon, May 27.

Chi Delta Chi was third with 381 points, followed by Delta Delta Chi with 185 and Eta Epsilon Alpha with 124.

Going into the last event, the broad jump — the K. D. A. held a narrow 694-683 lead, but the Sigma Betas came back, winning the fifth and the sixth, bringing them six points and the victory.

Outstanding performer of the day was Ernest Bonarth of Sigma Beta Mu. Bonarth failed to win a first, but more than made up for it as he placed in six events and netted the staggering total of 19 1/2 points. He was second in the 440, shot, and long hurdles, and was third in the high hurdles, high jump, and broad jump.

Other outstanding finalists were Doug Garber of Chi Delta Chi and Art Menendez of K. D. A. Garber gathered 13 1/2 points with a first in the pole vault, a tie for first in the high jump, and a second in the broad jump. Menendez scored 13 points, winning first in the mile, second in the two mile, and third in the 880 (a track event).

## CAPE PRESIDENT ANALYZES STUDY OF HIGHER EDUCATION

An analysis of a recent study of higher education by democracy in the United States, prepared by a special commission appointed by President Truman, was made by Dr. W. W. Parker, president of Southeastern Illinois State Teachers College, recently.

Addressing the Southern Illinois University chapter of the American Association of University Professors, Professor Parker termed the report a significant one. He agreed with many of the findings of the commission deploring (a) the inadequacy of social science study to prepare youth for democracy or for world understanding, (b) inadequacy of funds for education at all levels, and (c) the inability of colleges and universities to give the broad-based, broad-based education for the large enrollments of today.

Dr. Parker declared that the social sciences have not kept up with technology and the physical sciences, and expressed the opinion that students in both high school and college should be encouraged to understand and appreciate the nature of the sciences "without, of course losing the objective 'give of view'."

He pointed out that the nation's highest level is in school work, and that for education, and that the country spends as much for sometimes as it spends on education at all levels, from the kindergarten through college.

He reminded the audience that at the time of the last war, 4 percent of the young people of college age in this country were attending college, while in 1940 16 percent of the college-age youth were in college.

4,000,000 Students in College  
The number of students in college in this country has increased from 4,000,000 in 1900 to 12,000,000 in 1940. The commission estimates that approximately 4,000,000 students should be in college by 1960.

Dr. Parker stressed that better facilities must be provided, Dr. Parker declared.

He urged that colleges and universities should be given the fact that they cannot do as good a job of educating young people with large classes and overcrowded laboratories of today, rather than smaller classes with the somewhat questionable advantage of large classes.

At the conclusion of President Parker's address, the AAUP chapter elected new officers for next year, as follows: Dr. J. Gary Davis, president; to succeed Prof. E. G. Lewis; Dr. W. C. McDaniel as secretary; and Dr. Robert C. Turner, as treasurer.
