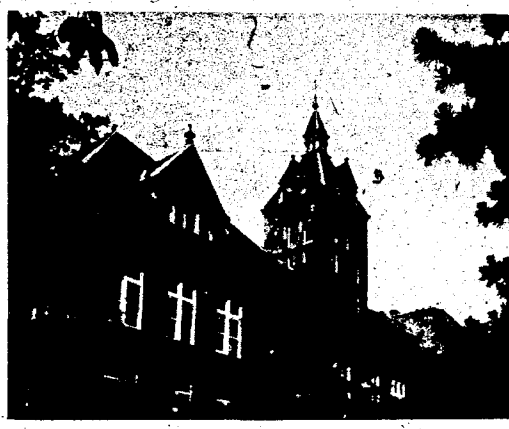
Davis Prexy of New Chapter of Kappa Alpha Mu

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SIU Has Movies Under the Stars

A series of theatrical films will be shown on Wednesday nights in McAndrew stadium this summer through the co-operation of the Lectures and Entertainment committee and Audio-Visual Aids. There will be no admission charge for these American and foreign films. In case of bad weather they will be shown in Shroyock auditorium.

The first of these movies will be shown tonight. It is "Sitting Pretty," an American film about the fabulous baby sister, Mr. Belvedere, who calmly and competently takes over the family of his employer and directs their lives through discipline and amusing channels. This film was chosen one of the "Ten Best" of the year and stars Clifton Webb, Robert Young, and Maureen O'Hara.

"Carroll in Flanders," a 1936 French film with English subtitles, will be shown June 24. It tells the story of the Flemish village of Boom which is preparing for its annual "kermesse" or carnival when mounted soldiers of Phillip of Spain dash into its midst. The town fathers become panic stricken; the pompous but cowardly burgomaster pretends to have died, hoping the invaders will respect the village in mourning and leave.

The women will have no part of this plan, however, and decide to captivate the dashing Spaniards with their feminine charms. This film won the Grand Prix Du Cinema Français, the highest French film award; the Gold Medal at the Venice Exposition, highest European award; and the best foreign film of the year, New York Film Critics award.

"Wilson," an American technical film, will be shown July 1. This movie is a documentary treatment of the political life of President Woodrow Wilson, his fight for world peace, and his retirement in 1920 when he left the White House in ill health. His plans for world peace through a League of Nations defeated by a hostile Senate is shown as a tragedy of a great man. Lead-

ing characters are played by Alexander Knox, Charles Coburn, and Geraldine Fitzgerald. This was also chosen as one of the "Ten Best" of the year.

The Italian film "Pissano" of 1947 has most of its dialogue in English. It will be here July 8. With the exception of four professional actors, the rest of the cast is made up of American, British and German soldiers and men, women and children from all parts of Italy. In theme is a relationship between a military, American, British, and German, and the Italian civilians. The film received "the Grand Prix" at Cannes World Film Festival, 1947; the honor of being voted Best Italian Film in 1947, Best Direction of 1947, Best Musical Score of 1947 by the Italian Film Critics and Technicians.

"How Green Was My Valley," an American, will be shown July 22. Starring Walter Pidgeon, Donald Crisp, Maureen O'Hara, and Anna Lee, it won an Academy Award and was chosen one of the "Ten Best" of the year. Family issues and 19th-century economics conditions and labor problems are set forth in this recounting of the transformation of a lovely valley in the hills of Wales into a grim and grimy mining district. As the district disintegrates so do the lives of its people.

The last movie of the season will be "Monsieur," a French film with English subtitles. It is the tale of faith and faithfulness between two strangely restless lovers in the upheaval and moral letdown of contemporary Europe. It was Grand Prize winner at Venice Film Festival.

Perils Of A Parachute Jumper

Carl Jordan Describes A Fast-Falling Business

"Sure a parachute can be dangerous. So can a car if you don't use it correctly. You've got to learn to trust both of them."

That's the opinion of Carl Jordan, freshman pre-med student who more than once has stepped into several thousand feet of nothing but air.

Like a lot of other guys, Carl spent a few years in bell-bottom trousers. But he was a different kind of sailor, far removed from battleships and submarines.

He was an aviation electrician attached to a parachute experimental unit at El Centro, Cal., in the middle of the Mojave desert.

Becoming a navy test jumper is an arduous process which includes physical conditioning, study of the chute, why it opens, tensile strength of harness and lines, inspection and methods of packing jump procedures and body positions when leaving the plane. It's a long tough grind even before they allow you to risk your neck testing new chute designs.

"This stuff about counting to ten after leaving the plane is a lot of bull!" says Jordan. "You simply make darned sure you're clear of the tail section, then pull the rip cord."

Most jumps are made from an RFD, a plane with a wide hatch and high tail assembly. As the plane approaches the jump area the jumpers are alerted and make a final check on harness and pack. At the signal they begin to leave the plane one by one, head first if they are wearing a pack, feet first if the pack is on their chest.

It is not unusual for a falling jumper to leave a few choice bits of obscenity lingering on the air behind him. That is for his benefit if the following lines:

"After you pull the ripcord, you actually fall away from the chute. You can look above and see it streaming behind you. It seems like five minutes before it opens and you receive the initial shock." This "initial shock," the sudden halt of the jumper's freely falling body, is considered by many to be the roughest part of the jump.

"Then everything is fine," says Jordan. Sounds reach you from great distances. It is possible to hear another jumper many yards away speaking in a conversational tone. But best of all, you feel completely detached from all creation. You feel as if you don't belong to the world.

Richard D. Lane, Forester in charge of the U. S. Forest Service Carbondale Research Center on the campus of Southern Illinois University, has been awarded a Certificate of Merit by the U. S. Forest Service.

Philip A. Brieble, director of the Central States Forest Experiment station, Columbus, Ohio, says the certificate is awarded for "extraordinary skill, resourcefulness, and leadership in development and extension of forest research programs in cooperation with state and private organizations in Southern Illinois."

Among these cooperating agencies is Southern Illinois University, which houses the research center and is working with the Forest Service in setting up a wood utilization pilot plant and making other forestry studies.

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Voigt Discovers Unique Flower In Pope County

A white flower found in Pope county by Dr. John M. Voigt, assistant professor in the botany department, is apparently the first white specimen of a Venus Looking Glass ever collected. The flower, which is mostly bluish-purple in color, is described by Dr. Voigt in an article soon to appear in Rhodora Magazine. Two other rare specimens found by Dr. Voigt also are identified.

Dr. Voigt, and other members of the botany department are conducting year-round search for various plants in Southern Illinois. He and his associates have assembled 2,000 flower species in the past three years from 16 Southern Illinois counties.

Dr. Voigt spotted about 10 of the rare white flowers from his car near Eddyville. They were among ordinary blue-flower forms of the Venus Looking Glass. He designated the new color form of the speculata perfoliata as forma alba. A single specimen of a sedge known to members of the botany profession as vyperus filicinus was found by Dr. Voigt near De Soto,

although this plant is usually found along the Atlantic and Gulf Coast.

A third plant listed by Dr. Voigt's article is a plant called glaucum mutabile which was found in considerable quantities atop a sandstone bluff near Trig Tower in Johnson county. The plant had existed only in St. Clair county in never been reported previously in Illinois.

Illinois though it is found in Indiana and Missouri.

The botanist's collection of rare specimens also includes a Quillworm discovered at Giant City State park. It was previously known to exist only in St. Clair county in Illinois.
