## Is SIU Judicially Mature?

Will SIU students have a part in making judicial decisions next year? Probably not.

Placing a Campus Judicial Board like Southern's in a student constitution is an insult to the principle of student government. It would probably be best described as a faculty-administration board.

**Her's Why:** Board members will be selected "with the advice of the Office of Student Affairs — chalk up one against the students.

The Director of Student Affairs (add another point for the administration) will select as many as three from the faculty to advise the board — another negative point for students.

The board will not have the power to make final decisions — just recommendations BACK TO THE OFFICE OF STUDENT AFFAIRS — minimize students.

A bit of advice to students: Save your time and effort. Although you have the prerogative of appealing your case to either the board or the Office of Student Affairs, your case will end up where it does now — the Office of Student Affairs.

Why all the power for the faculty and administration? On the topic, an administrator has said: "Southern's students are not ready to accept the responsibility of a judicial board."

In effect this is saying that although SIU graduates thousands of students with bachelor's degrees, nine cannot be found among the group to make independent decisions.

Does Southern want employers to accept SIU students for positions of responsibility when Southern itself is afraid to risk its own students' decisions?

## Salute To Salukis

During the past nine months, Southern's varsity athletic teams have treated SIU students and faculty to many exciting and sports events. The caliber of some of these events has been the highest ever seen on the SIU campus.

SIU's varsity teams have compiled a very impressive won-loss mark over the past school year of 77 wins and only 36 losses.

Four squads, wrestling, gymnastics, baseball and golf, have rolled up their best seasons in the history of the school.

The Salukis captured two IAC crowns. The Baseball and tennis teams brought home these crowns two weeks ago. Four other SIU teams, basketball, gymnastics, wrestling and swimming finished second in Interstate Conference battles.

Besides racking up impressive won-loss marks the Southern squads have provided many other thrills for SIU fans during the past school year. The basketball team had the distinction of scoring the most number of points in a single game in

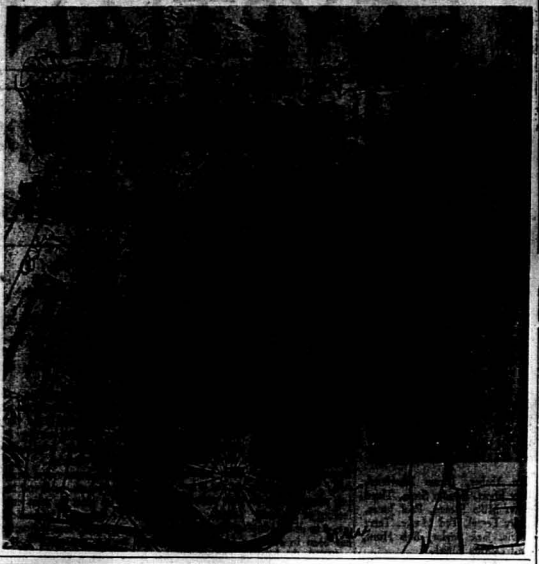
the nation as they rolled over Eastern Michigan 128-6 last winter.

The gymnastic team downed three Big Ten opponents during their season. The football team had their best season since 1947. SIU's wrestling team won nine matches while losing none. Southern's track team although not overly impressive as a team, had some outstanding individual performers. Two all-time records were broken and a couple more were threatened.

The baseball team, which coach Abe Martin call his best ever, provided many thrills on the varsity diamond as they lost only one home contest.

The many records and outstanding marks that have been written into the books this year are certainly a well deserved tribute to Donald Boynton and his very capable staff for the marvelous job that they have done.

All-in-all it was quite a year for Salukis fans, coaches, and players, and the next year promises to be an even better one.

No amount of reflection or gazing at the past is really valuable unless it gives us ideas on how to make improvements in the future. The past should serve as a springboard to the future.

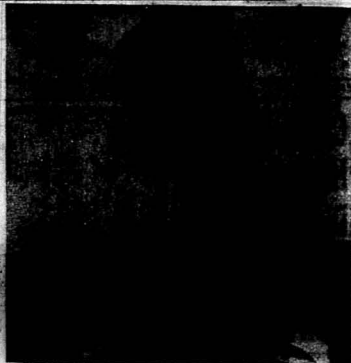
## STUDENTS INITIATED INTO HONOR SOCIETY
