Doctors Tenney, Alexander And Lawson Lead in Third Post War Discussion Group

Dr. Charles Tenney, Dr. Orville Alexander and Dr. Douglas E. Lawson, speakers in the panel discussion on the topic, "The Future of the Race Problems in the United States," discussed the Japanese, Jewish, and Negro phases of the topic at the discussion held last Thursday evening in the Little Theatre. Over seventy students, faculty and townspeople attended the second of the series of Post-War Discussion Forums being held on the campus this term.

In his treatment of the Japanese problem, Dr. Tenney emphasized the fact that the United States' treatment of minority groups, has given the Japanese a good argument to use as an explanation for their present attempt to subject the oriental people. In addition, he pointed out that the Japanese-Americans to concentration camps, the negative attitude of such organizations as the Post-War United States, the Hearst Press, and the Associated Farmers in California, who feed the cheap, competitive labor and other prejudices tend to make not "... a particularly pretty picture," he said.

"The Japanese problem is even more complicated than the Negro and the Jewish problems," he asserted. "Few people realize that Negroes or Jews of nationalistic or imperialist intentions, and few people regard Negroes or Jews as enemies, as spies or agents of force to expend race hatreds," he explained. In order to understand the problem, a knowledge of their historical traditions must be understood and examined. In conclusion, he mentioned as outstanding groups of the oriental people of giving encouragement to the loyal-Japanese-American citizenry, and those who have left Japan because of displacement, should endeavor to improve the economic status of the people, and should protect against unfair discrimination against the Japanese or any other minority group.

The Reverend John Maxwell Adams, vice president and supervisor of the services of 72 and variety pastors maintained by the Presbyterian Board of Christian Education and Westminster Foundations at 60 state colleges and universities, in cooperation with educational administrators. It is his responsibility to exhibit the interest of pastors, faculty and other laymen in the opportunities for church work among students.

Dr. Adams, who was born in Greenburg, Ind., attended Washburn College and McCormick Theological Seminary, now the Presbyterian Theological Seminary of Chicago. He did post-graduate work at the University of Edinburgh in Scotland, and at the University of Liverpool in England. Before Dr. Adams became director of university work at Presbyterian Board of Christian Education his work had been of an educational nature. He was a teacher in the faculty of the Women's Christian College, and in the faculty of the University of Oregon and pastor of Northlander Presbyterian Church near the campus of Ohio State University, Columbus, Ohio.

Dr. Adams is a member of the United Church of Christ, the National Christian Youth Movement, and chairman of the American Presbyterian Board of Christian Education, and of the World Student Christian Foundation.

The Reverend H. D. Bollinger, president and director of University Pastors and Student Work, Board of Education, Northern Baptist Conference, is the son of the Reverend Newton G. Fetter, who held several pastories in Pennsylvania and Iowa. Fetter was previous to his marriage, was a church organist and teacher of music.

Fetter was graduated from Dole-Don, Pa., High School in 1907, the Berean Normal School in 1908 and from Bucknell University in 1909. He graduated from the Ohio Wesleyan University in 1912. He was on the debating team, editor of the college paper, member of several chess societies, and a member of Delta Sigma Gamma. He was graduated from the Ohio Wesleyan University in 1914. 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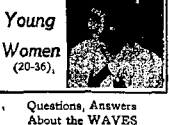
