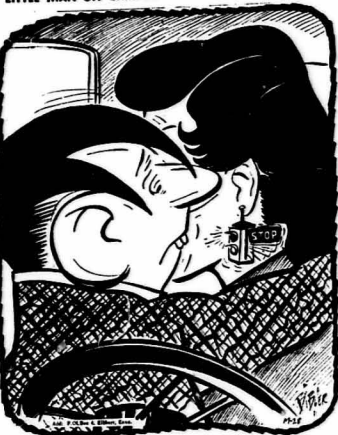

## About 94 Units To Parade On Homecoming

About 94 units will participate in the 1955 Homecoming parade, which will start at 10 a. m. Saturday.

This year, the parade will take a different route than in previous years. Forming at Sycamore and in University streets, it will travel south on University to the gates of the campus, where it will disband.

About 40 floats and 14 stunts will highlight the biggest parade in SIU history. In addition, some 2,200 high school students comprising 40 bands will travel to Carbondale from the surrounding area to participate.

There will be three float classes this year: women's living centers, men's living centers and organizations. First and second place trophies will be awarded to the winners in each class, and plaques will be given to the stunt winners.

Judging will be on the basis of organization, cleverness, originality, craftsmanship, and crowd appeal, with a possible high of five points for each category.

Any organization or group which entered a float or stunt and does not receive a set of instructions before tomorrow is asked to contact Don Gibbs or Tom Sill at the Homecoming office in the Student Union. All floats should be in place and ready to start at 9 a. m.

cancellation beginning at 6 a. m. on the day of the parade: WMLI, Murphysboro; WJFF, Herrin; WCIL, Carbondale; WKRO, Cairo; WDQN, Du Quoin; WGGH, Marion; and WMOK, Metropolis.

### Miller Stresses 'Teacher Shortage' At Convention

"There is a shortage of teachers. There will never be a nation of one teacher to one pupil," said Dr. Van Miller, professor of education, University of Illinois.

Dr. Miller, main speaker for the convention attended by about 2,000 teachers of the Illinois Education Association in Shrook Auditorium Friday, placed great emphasis on the part the teacher plays in the individual's life.

"There are both favorable and unfavorable differences among individuals," he told the assembly, "and the watchword for the teachers to follow is favorable differences."

"It is a part of our job not to injure these differences. We need to have some means through which we can talk to each other."

Speaking with enthusiasm and in a very clear tone of voice, Dr. Miller told the delegates that schools represent the service of society.

"In our American way of life," Dr. Miller said, "we want each individual to make his life the best he can."

William H. Carruthers, president of the I.E.A., gave a morning address entitled "How Firm is Our Foundation?"

Funds for education in Illinois must increase with enrollment to keep standards from sliding, Carruthers told the assembly.

"About seven cents of the dollar is spent for schools," Carruthers said.

Carruthers, superintendent of schools at Murphysboro, called for a change in the state pupil transportation aid program.

Under the present Illinois program, schools are granted a flat \$3.00 per pupil for transportation. "This is not enough assistance for districts with sparse populations," he said.

"There should be some way to take into consideration bus mileage as well as other cost factors," he said.

"There is no subsidy from any source. The people have to stand the burden."

During a morning social hour, the teachers consumed 2,000 doughnuts and 125 gallons of coffee prepared by the SIU Home Economics Department.

Dr. J. E. Grinnell, Dean of the SIU College of Education, welcomed the delegates to the meeting.

### 'Propaganda Appeals To Emotions'

"Propaganda is that which appeals to the emotions rather than to reason," said Dr. J. E. Grinnell, Dean of the College of Education.

Dean Grinnell spoke before the combined members of the FTA and Kappa Delta Psi, an honorary organization for outstanding men and women in education in the Life Science Auditorium.

A bad line center on SIU's try for the extra point after their second touchdown proved to be the deciding factor in the SIU-Western Illinois 13-13 deadlock Saturday at Macomb.

The Leathernecks tallied first early in the opening stanza. They received the kickoff of their own 25. On the strength of quarterback Bill Vandermert's throwing arm, they marched up the sloppy, muddy field. Vandermert eluded the march with a two yard sneak with 9:10 left in the first quarter. At Vandermert converted to put the Leathernecks ahead 7-0.

The Salukis received and began a march of their own which fell short on the Western 21.

When the hosts took over, Vandermert exercised his arm again and, with the aid of some unbelievable catches of the slippery oval by Southern receivers, put them deep in Saluki territory. A pass game the hosts a first down on the two, from where Jack Lilgebeck scored on the next play. SIU end Walt Bishop broke in to block the try for the extra point, but Western held 13-0.

After an exchange of punts, SIU had the ball on their 47. A series of runs by Jerry Hurt, Jack Schneider and Ed Johnson took the ball to the Western 1. Here Schneider pushed into receiver with 55 yards left in the first half.

In the opening minutes of the third stanza, the Salukis drove inside the Western 25 twice, losing the ball on turnovers both times.

The first time, Wayne Williams blocked a punt on the Western 35. They lost the ball at the 24.

Jerry Smith recovered a Leathernecks fumble a few seconds later, but the Southerners ran out of gas on the 13.

The third try proved to be a charm. The Salukis held, and Western kicked to the 39.

The Southerners thrust to the three, and Schneider scored his second touchdown of the day on the next play. Then came the bad pass from center and the score stayed at 13-13.

Late in the final period, the Salukis Jim Land intercepted a pass on the Western 30. A 21 yard pass from Hurt to Civer Shannon gave the Salukis a first down on the nine, but a holding penalty on the next play doomed the scoring threat. This play needed one yard. Then Shannon tried a 33 yard field goal. But, he was kicking into a stiff wind and the ball fell short of the mark.
