Beynolds gave "better acquainted" the student body with the work the council is doing as the reason for the committees. A full report of investigation on each subject will be returned to the council and then referred to The Egyptian for publication, Beynolds said.

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Other appointments approved were those of Jim McKinstry, interior radio major and Jack Morgan, senior education major, to the Council on Interscholastic Athletics.

The subject of appointments came in for more discussion when Frances Beynolds told the group he was in search of a suitable finding people to fill all the various appointive positions on campus. A special committee composed of Lutus Johnson, Jack Davis and Shirley Gott was named to assist the president in appointments.

As a regular meeting date for the fall term, the committee decided 8:15 p. m. each Thursday. All meetings will be held in the Little Theater at University School. Council members also picked Saturday afternoon, Oct. 15, as the date for a conducted tour of the campus and the Vocational Technical Institute suggested by Dean of Men L. Clark Davis.

A request for \$75 by Dean Gibbs, co-chairman of the prep committee, was deleted by the group. The prep committee was instructed to prepare an itemized budget of its needs for the coming year and to submit this at the next council meeting.

Other visiting faculty will be Oliver H. Gray, a consulting geophysicist and former assistant director of the Carnegie Institute of Washington, who will be assigned to the physics department; and Dr. Harvey B. Walker, Ohio State University government professor, who will spend the spring term at Southern.

Additions to the School of Business and Industry faculty are: A. M. Dr. Robert Laver, Texas A & M; Dr. Ralph D. Swick, Indiana University; Emerson Clayton Ellis, former traveling auditor for the Bendix Aviation Corporation; and University of Illinois graduate William B. Hargis, who will work with the Small Business Unit and teach marketing.

Taking over as head of the industrial education department is Dr. Ralph O. Callaghan, who has earned degrees at Columbia University, George Washington University and Indiana State. Also joining this department are Dr. John Howard Erickson, a graduate of Pennsylvania State College and who has been teaching at Madison High School.

A veteran of 30 years in the teaching field, Dr. Phillips will be teaching math and banking a unit spearheaded by the graduate staff of Washington State College.

Heading the list of visiting faculty members is Dr. Chester A. Phillips, former dean of the Iowa State University College of Commerce, who has accepted a one-year appointment as professor in the School of Business and Industry.

Recent additions to the faculty of the psychology department are Israel Goldfarb, a graduate of the University of Chicago; William Lyle, former researcher in child psychology at Iowa University; David Palermo, Iowa University; and Henry Daniels, former industrial psychologist for the Crosley Oil Company in Venezuela.

Audio-Visual Conclave Held At U School

The third annual Audio-Visual Conference was held at University School Tuesday.

The first of four similar regional meetings to be held in Illinois this year, it was sponsored by the SIU Audio-Visual Aids Service.

Specialists in the field from SIU, the University of Illinois and the National Education Association participated in the program.

Floyd E. Brooker, Washington, D. C., executive secretary of the NEA department of audio-visual instruction, spoke for a half hour at the conference luncheon session.

"Are we teaching our children loyalty of country, and when the time comes, are they willing to sacrifice for it?" asked Mr. Brooker.

"We use the verbal, and yet do not understand what the other person is talking about. Because of the difference in the background of people, a word brings a different meaning to different people," said Mr. Brooker.

Discussions were held and demonstrations were given on the various phases of making and using audio-visual equipment.

"The program should prove especially helpful for Southern Illinois classroom teachers," said Donald A. Inglis, SIU audio-visual aids director.

Normal Scholarship Holders To Pay Union Building Fund Fee

All students who attend school under the Normal School Scholarship will have to pay the one dollar Student Union building fund fee.

The Illinois State Legislature when it revised the Illinois School Code put in a clause stating that all persons attending school under the Normal School Scholarship will pay the Student Union building fund fee of one dollar.

Since this bill was passed after fee cards had been mailed, the Registrar's Office decided it would lessen confusion by billing all Normal School scholarship holders at the same time. A statement will be mailed to scholarship holders in mid-October concerning the fee.

Scholarship holders are asked not to try to pay the fee until they receive the statement from the Registrar.

Radio, TV Students Initiate New Greek Letter Organization

Unanimous approval of a new organization to replace the Southern Broadcasters Guild on campus was voiced Thursday night by students of the radio and TV department.

Sigma Beta Gamma is the name of the new organization.

The purpose of the organization is to foster a close bond of relationship between its members, to promote the highest possible standards of broadcasting and to provide an outlet for participation in the field of radio and TV by the membership.

"In the past, membership was limited to radio majors," said Fred Jim McKinstry, "Under our new organization anyone can join."

Sigma Beta Gamma will have its headquarters in the Radio Building.

Membership is open to any undergraduate student of SIU who maintains a 3.0 grade-point average and who fulfills the following requirements: A total of seven points to be earned while an initiate member. Points may be earned in the following manner: Writing a script for broadcast, 2 points; directing a program, 2 points; program participations, 1 point each.

An initiate member must offer points in at least two of the three categories. No more than four points may be submitted for participations.

All members of the Southern Broadcasters Guild, in good standing as of September 22, 1955 are charter members of Sigma Beta Gamma.

The new organization will be an affiliate of the Southern Broadcasters Guild of which Students will no longer be members.

The Southern Broadcasters Guild will be composed of radio announcers and program directors in Southern Illinois.

To date, the new Greek letter organization only has a tentative schedule for coming events.

One of the first speakers will be Dr. Forest Wham, Director of Radio and TV at Kansas State College. The date has not been set.

"We plan on having a regular 30 minute broadcast every week," said Bill Turner, promotion director.

"Before we broadcast our first program, we will have a reserve of at least 25 programs on tape,"

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Men's Residence Halls Supervisor Devises Safety Rules Against Theft

Mr. Jack Buckle, new supervisor of Men's Residence Halls has devised six safety rules to prevent thefts in Organized Housing, in or out of the campus.

"Protect your own property. It is not reflection on others for you to take the simplest precautions to prevent loss.

1. If your room door is provided with a key, always lock it when the lock your door and carry your room key with you, even when you only plan to be away from the room for a few minutes for a short trip to the bath, lounge, or to a friend's room.

2. Never leave money, booklets, jewelry, or other small articles of value on your dresser or desk, even when you are in the room. Out items of this nature in a drawer where they are not easily accessible. The act of having valuable items where they are tempting and easily available to others is unfair to them. Don't take a chance on making it easy for a thief.

3. If you have a radio, record player, typewriter, or other item of valuable property, keep a record of its description and the serial numbers so it can be readily traced by the police in the event it is stolen.

Schneider, Warfield Score On Long Runs

A personal foul on the part of a Central Michigan lineman on an attempted conversion after the Chip's first touchdown proved to be the deciding factor in the Salukis' 14-13 upset of the highly-rated Chips Saturday night. The foul was committed on the first try for the point, and the Chips were forced to try again from the 17. The second try was no good. The play proved to be one of the very few breaks of the game for the Southerners.

SIU kicked off to open the contest. The visitors marched from their own seven to the SIU 15 before they were stopped.

On the first play by the Salukis, Hank Warfield fumbled, and the Chips took over to go the

distance, with fullback Bob McNamara going the final two yards. Then came the foul and missed conversion.

Early in the second stanza, the Salukis had the ball on their own 47. After grinding out a first down, they found themselves with a fourth and five situation on the chip 25. Then Jack Schneider intercepted a 25 yard romp to paralyze that knotted the score at 0-6. Bill Spratt converted to put the hosts out in front 7-6 with 11:13 minutes left in the half.

The remainder of the half was a battle of who could intercept the most passes.

The visitors were stopped twice in the opening minutes of the third period as they dove deep into Saluki territory. The second drive ended in a missed field goal attempt by end Jerry Walz.

The Salukis took over on their own 20. Two plays advanced the ball to the 28. On third down, Warfield blazed through tackle for 72 yards and the touchdown. He carried a Chip tackler the last five yards on his back. Spratt converted for the final and game-winning point.

The Chippees roared back with Beterink returning the kick off to mid-field. Then King, the

quarterback, hit left end Emerson with an aerial that first bounced on the hands of SIU defenders before Emerson grabbed it for the tally.

In the closing minutes Schneider snufft out any hopes the Chips had of scoring again.

In the dressing room after the contest, SIU coach Al Kaval was
