BARBARA BURT HUBBS, FORMER STUDENT, PUBLISHES BOOK ON WILLIAMSON COUNTY HISTORY

Barbara Burt Hubbs, who was an S. I. N. U. graduate of the two-year course in 1921, recently published Pioneer Folks and Places, a new history of Williamson county. Mrs. Hubbs is now vice-president of the S. I. N. U. alumni group of Cook county. She was a student assistant in Wheeler Library from 1919-1921. The book, which contains about two hundred fifty pages, also contains a map of Williamson county and several illustrations. It was written in an effort to preserve the neighborhood traditions and the tales of the people, as well as to record the contents of some hundred-year-old official papers which are not generally known. Sketches of Lives

of Citizens included leading citizens and families connected with early settlements in Williamson county are described in the book, and biographical sketches of each Williamson county resident who has served in the Illinois General Assembly and also of the first American residents who have been members of the United States Congress are provided. These sketches include mention of outstanding legislation or political action which marked each man's term.

The background and the story of the county's formation is detailed in the book, together with a full story of the legislative act creating it and a description of the days at Vandalia which saw the presentation of Williamson county as a Territory to the state of Illinois. Mrs. Hubbs is from

Family of Western Illinois. The author, has a record of the genealogies of the county's early pioneers, many of whom were interested in Southern Illinois' early history. The history of the county in Murphysboro is given, too, the scene of informal historical meetings, at which the "Legs of Southern Illinois" dominance in state affairs are retold.

It is Mrs. Hubbs and her husband, Harry Hubbs, have collected the material for the past twelve years. The book is the basis of the book which will be published by the Illinois Historical Survey and published in a historical part of the county's

Coch Glenn "Abe" Martin in his initial year as Southern's head football coach sends his "A" squad of candidates through the final workout of their first complete week of practice this afternoon. STUDENT HEALTH SERVICE PLAN PARTIALLY CHANGED

On July 1 the following conditions with regard to Student Health Service for the year 1939 and 1940 which had been suggested by a joint committee of town physicians and faculty members, of whom Dr. Monroe Richardson is chairman, were approved and went into effect:
1. Each physician who elects to participate in the program will render his services for a week at a time in alphabetical rotation. A referral slip should be obtained from the college health office for each week.
2. Surgical services as ordinarily defined are not to be included in this program.
3. Dental services, excepting such as can be construed to be emergency services, are not to be included in this program.
4. Students will be provided with all medicines or prescriptions by the physician in charge.
5. Where bedside visits are deemed necessary, a charge of \$5.00 for daytime visits and \$10.00 for night calls will be collected from students by the business office. The purpose of this arrangement is to discourage unnecessary bedside calls by students. The money thus collected will be placed in a special health fund set up by the college to be used as hereinafter provided.
6. Fees for diagnostic tests such as X-rays, basal metabolism, and the like, if advisable, will be provided from the special fund which is to accrue from charges made for bedside visits. In each case, the college physician has authority to determine whether the college will assume responsibility for the payment of such tests.
7. During the week when a given physician is on service all referrals whatsoever for which the college is responsible shall be sent to him. Students who do not desire his services will have to pay their own fees if they are treated by a physician who is not on duty for the week.
