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POLITICAL MEDICINE IN AMERICA

On June 3, 1942, Senator Wagner introduced a bill in the Senate. This bill provides for medical care for everyone. The system is compulsory and 75% of everyone's pay check is taken out to provide for medical care.

It provides for the creation of a Surgeon-General who will be sole dictator of the entire medical system of America. The Surgeon-General has the power to create a board to assist him. The members of this board will receive compensation at the rate of \$25 per day for time spent on official business of the council, and actual and necessary traveling expenses per diem in lieu of subsistence.

It is implied by the act that the distribution of compulsory savings managed by federal authority will guarantee better health care for all people. I sincerely doubt that such an objective can be realized in this way.

The Bill would absolutely abolish the volunteer hospital and in operation that have brought medical education to all. It would destroy the standards of excellence that we have characterized the medical schools of America.

Political medicine means that the sick people must depend upon a doctor who is paid by the government, working a hours per day. The emergency sickness must wait until the doctor is on duty.
