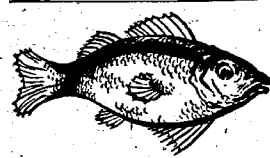

# Dope Den Found In Dean's Office

## Revenuers Discover Still In Chem Lab

## Many Implicated In Quick Federal Raid

In a spectacular raid yesterday, police rounded up members of a multi-million dollar narcotics syndicate at their headquarters in the Office of Students Affairs.

In words of one available, it was I. Yes, I did it and I'm glad. So now you know that it was a who.

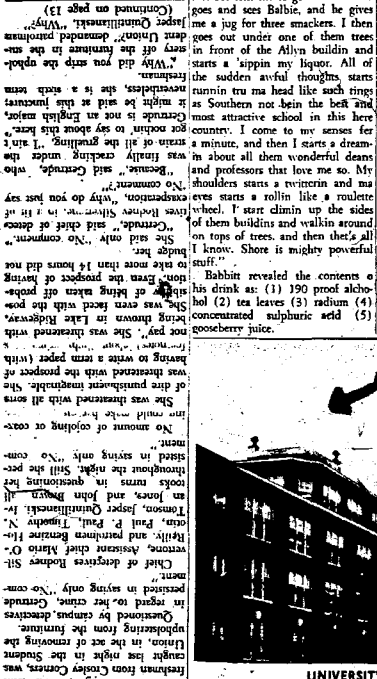

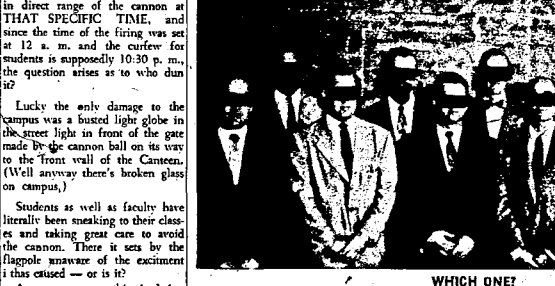
