It's easy to get discouraged in these pre-exam days. We sometimes wonder if it's worth it. Well, recently a couple of population experts announced that a college education is worth it—money-wise.

They estimated that the male college graduate will receive an average of \$100,000 more lifetime income than the average high school graduate.

They figured the cost of a college education at \$9,000.

An earning lifetime for the college graduate was figured at 22 to 24 years of age or until death, if death occurred before the age of 74.

The figures used reflected such factors as illness, disability and unemployment.

"The General Bureau" experts estimated the "lifetime" income for an elementary school graduate at \$116,000; for the man who completes one to three years of high school, \$130,000; for the man who completes four years of high school, \$151,000; for the man who completes one to three of college, \$190,000; and for the man who completes four years or more of college, \$265,000.

Vets' Checks In Before End Of Term—Maybe!

Vets will get December checks before they go home for Christmas—maybe.

In a letter received last Thursday by Dr. Robert A. McGrath, registrar, the Veterans Administration said that it had adopted a special speed-up system to get most of the monthly GI allowances checked before they go home for the Christmas holidays.

Usually, VA said, the checks are mailed around the 20th of the month. But in December, many schools and colleges begin their Christmas vacations before that date. Therefore, VA is making a special effort to mail the checks beforehand.

The VA Chicago Regional Office said that all attendance forms for November received before yesterday will be processed in the "speed-up" system. All forms filled out up to and including last Monday by the vets at SIU were mailed in to the VA. So, they would fall into the "speed-up" system," McGrath said.

"This does not mean that the check will arrive by the end of this quarter, it means that we have come out utmost to see that they do. If the 'speed-up' system works the way the VA says it will, they will probably arrive the last day of the term," McGrath said.

Hastings Redefines An Audience, Qualifications Of Good Speaker

Daniel Webster defines an audience as "a group of hearers." Will more Hastings give his definition as "people with whom you meet."

Hastings, lecturer in the School of Business and Industry at SIU, has spoken before a wide variety of audiences including labor organizations, school assemblies, Chamber of Commerce groups and social clubs in all parts of the nation, primarily in the middle west.

When asked to compare audiences reaction in different parts of the country Hastings gave a few simple reasons why people differ.

Why Audiences React
"People react differently in different parts of the country," said Hastings, "because some have different feelings and interests on the subjects about which you are speaking. This can be noticed at two different episodes in the same group."

"There is a changing degree of interest between old and young people. People come to hear addresses generally upon their own free will. They may not be in agreement with the speaker but they are interested in his topic."

Different Reaction
"You don't get the same type of reaction in student assemblies because the student usually has no attention. He's just there for 50 minutes. He leaves having given no attention to the speech."

Hastings, former sales manager of the Clinton Lock Co. of Canton, Iowa and vice president of the LaBelle Photographic Corporation of Oconomowoc, Wis., gave some qualifications of a good speaker.

Say Something
"A sincere speaker should be somewhat tired after he has finished," said Hastings. "The speaker has put out something and was not merely talking to hear his ears rattle."

"Success depends not only on the material you have but on the attempt you put forth to reach the audience."

"You have to prepare. If you aren't prepared you can't talk. You have to adjust yourself to the particular audience."

Speech Shouldn't Bore
"A speech should be long enough to interest and short enough to bore," he said. "When asked how long a speech should be to successfully hold the interest of the audience."

A graduate of the University of Illinois in 1932, Hastings gave three rules to be used in public speaking.

"Stand up so the audience can see you, speak up so they can hear you and shut up when you're through."

Titan Don Quillman sank two free throws in the final seconds of play to provide the margin of victory in the Illinois Wesleyan 71-70 victory over SIU here Tuesday night.

With the Titans leading 69-68, Joe Johnson of SIU fouled Quillman who subsequently dropped in both his free throws.

The Salukis led by 10 points midway through the first half and threatened to make the game a runaway, but the Titans slowly closed the gap and the hosts held a five-point, 57-52, edge at intermission.

A cold Saluki squad took the floor after the half and failed to score in the first three minutes of the final period. From that point on it was a tight contest all the way to the wire, as the score was tied five times and neither team had a substantial margin at any time.

Free throws were the deciding factor in the battle with the visitors connecting on 28 of 29, SIU's 16 of 24. However, SIU hit on 27 shots from the floor to 25 for the visitors.

Glen Newton, Titan center, set the scoring pace for both teams by dumping in 27 points. He was followed in Titan scoring by Chuck Hohlbecker with 13, and by Dick Welch and Dick Blythe tied at 10 points each.

SIU Profs Write On New Free Throw Lane

The new college 12-foot free throw lane will bring about some defense, more fast break, less hook shots, greater demand for a big player who is fast, and added emphasis on good "out-bid" shooters, according to a survey of college coaches.

These conclusions were reached in an article in the November issue of the Journal of Health, Physical Education, and Recreation magazine. The authors Roosevelt D. Merrick and Donald N. Boudreau of Southern Illinois University, base their predictions on comments of 23 of the nation's top college coaches.

The new rule, which goes into effect this year, widens the college free throw lane from six to twelve feet.

E. A. Diddle, coach at Western Kentucky State College, predicts that players 6-4 and 6-5 can now compete with those who are 6-7 and taller. "I believe," he says, "at some time it is inevitable to prevent stalling, basketball with the 12-foot lane will perhaps be a better game than it has ever been before, because it will force the smaller players a chance to compete on an equal basis with the big men. Of course, you know a big man who is really fast will be as much of a handicap to the opponent and, in some cases, to his own team as before. It will be the big, slow boys who will be most affected."

overall effectiveness of tall players will be seriously affected. "They will lose some cheap baskets by tips-in after missed free throws and may lose some other offensive counts, but I do not believe that their game will be materially affected," observes Wooden.

Big Men Affected

Bradley University Coach Robert Vanatta is of the opinion that a big man's scoring ability will be affected by the length of his shots.

"My belief," he explains, "is that we are going to have to have more speed from our big boys if we are going to present a good non-man defense."

"The new rule," according to St. Louis University Coach Eddie Hickley, "will bring about more emphasis on the moving pivot. There will be continuous movement of all offensive players, thereby offering more control of the defensive coverage. The wide lane definitely offers greater possibility for development of some type of zone defense... (however) offensive changes will still be more adequately and satisfactorily met with the man-to-man coverage."

Florida State University Coach Floyd S. Stahl, Ohio State University Coach James E. Sullivan, and other coaches predict that the rule will be changed considerably from the pivot. "The new rule will be put a premium," he says, "on the pivot man who is active. The defense will not be forced to find a man tall enough to cover the entire pivot man, who could remain stationary near the basket and hook with either hand."

Will Draw Defense

North Carolina State College Coach Everett N. Case suggests that set shooters may be inserted into the lineup to draw the defense away from the basket, thereby making it easier to score from underneath. "Much movement of the ball with clever ball handling and quick, sharp passes," he continues, "will necessitate ball handlers in the offensive lineup. Fast, speedy, front court men will be needed to handle the stationary defenders for rebounds."
