Small Business Institute Has Workshop Here

The Southern Illinois University Small Business Institute will sponsor a "problem-solving" workshop for retail hardware dealers February 12 in the SIU cafeteria.

The Illinois Retail Hardware Association is acting as co-sponsor of the event.

Ralph Bedwell, director of the Small Business Institute, said the sessions would be devoted primarily to helping the retail dealer recognize his problems and then solve them.

Speakers will include Bedwell, W. B. ("Coy") Hastings, sales consultant for the institute; Frank Stumberg, management consultant; Gene Cox of Marion, president of the Illinois Retail Hardware Association; and William F. Evers, managing director of the association.

High point of the day will be a "case demonstration" by some employees of Bradley Hardware, Carbondale, according to Bedwell.

"This will be a demonstration of how to do what we've been teaching all day," he said. "The employees are going to present some problems. Our staff will analyze them and try to solve them."

The institute plans to use this workshop method for other retail lines in the future.

Symphony Meets With Applause On All Counts

The audience refused to leave last Tuesday's evening concert in Shroyck Auditorium.

The crowd of about 800 ardent music lovers applauded enthusiastically when the Southern Illinois Symphony Orchestra concluded its program with Moussorgsky's "The Great Gate of Kiev" from his "Pictures at an Exhibition."

The orchestra, with its members smiling broadly, resumed playing the Moussorgsky work again, with renewed vigor.

"Not one person made a move following the conclusion of the program," he added joyfully. "It was wonderful."

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Tankmen Meet Loyola Here Today; Gymnasts Take On Ball State Tomorrow

Southern Illinois University's swimming team, unbroken at home in more than two years, hosts Loyola University of Chicago—the last team to defeat SIU here—here Friday (Feb. 7).

Southern, 10-1 last season and 3-1 so far this year, has been un-defeated at the SIU pool since losing to Loyola University Feb. 3, 1956.

Earlier winner over Kansas, Chicago, and Western Illinois, SIU will be a slight favorite even though the squad has been plagued by injuries and scholastic difficulties, forcing several key performers to leave the team.

It will be SIU's final home meet of the season.

Ball State will be the opponent in the 1:30 meet. The meet was originally scheduled for 7:30 p.m. but because of the conflicts with other activities on campus it was changed to the 1:30 time.

The Salukis won their first two meets of the year against Central Michigan and Northwestern University. The gymnasts then fell to the nation's number one team, Illinois and Western Illinois.

Next Saturday (Feb. 15), the SIU swimmers will be at Illinois Normal.

Friday's meet will begin at 4 p.m.

Their recent success is interesting to note because of the changes in the personnel on the starting five.

Quit School

Approximately three weeks ago, Marvin Jones, 6-3 center from East St. Louis quit school, at the time he quit school, was tied with Seymour Bryson for the lead in total points and had the best average on the squad. Jones was also the leading rebounder on the team.

Oddly enough since Jones quit school the team has been going better. This is not knocking Jones' ability because he was probably the best shot on the team. He had the potential to be one of the best

basketball players in Southern's history but for some reason they have been playing better ball since he left.

Quite possibly a more logical reason for the team's recent success is the point production of Garrison Newsome, who was brought up off the JV squad to start the last four games and "Rick" Talley, senior forward who spent most of the first eight or nine games on the bench.

Newsome didn't have a point in varsity competition until he started in the Ft. Wood game. In the next four games he hit 12, 24, 12, and 14 for a 15 point per game average.

"Rick" Talley, senior from Pinckneyville, has been one of Southern's most productive scorers in the past two years. At the beginning of this season, Talley moved from his usual forward spot to guard because of some promising frosh players. He found the transition hard and couldn't produce and was in the running for the "most bench time award."

The Northern Illinois Huskies are an experienced squad, and have won four of their last five, the
