SOUTHERN FORCES INSANITARY SITUATION UPON STUDENTS

During the past year S. I. N. U. carried on a "clean-up" campaign which was conceived and executed chiefly through the efforts of the Student Council, the Egyptian, and some few individuals... This was an attempt to bring about more nearly sanitary conditions in establishments that serve food... Those business houses complying with the regulations were awarded seals to indicate their cooperation... However, in this drive at least one place very important to the students was overlooked: the college itself... Under present conditions this college could obtain no seal of approval on sanitation were such a seal for colleges in existence...'

It could not so long as physical education is required of women with no facilities for their showering after participation in activities in these classes... Japanese Will Never Conquer China Believes Director of Anthony Hall

By EILEEN GAMERON "Forgetting the European war zone for a time and considering the Far Eastern struggle, an interview this week with Miss Julia M. Barnes, Director of Anthony Hall, brought forth some of her opinions on the high-lights of the Chinese-Japanese situation... Miss Barnes is very well acquainted with the Chinese and their culture since she, herself, has lived in China... She has taught English for a time at Orling College, Nanking... Miss Barnes is especially interested in what is happening to the colleges and universities of China in the face of Japanese invasions... Most of the educational institutions located in the invaded territory, including the colleges in which Miss Barnes taught, have been moved into the interior... The reason for this is obvious, since if they continued to operate in Japanese territory, Japanese text books and propaganda would be used in the classrooms... The American University at Peking is still operating, however... In Miss Barnes's opinion, the Japanese will never be able to completely conquer China... giving responsibility for this belief, Miss Barnes cited the fact that even with western military equipment and tactics, Japan has thus far conquered less than one fourth of the immense area of China... In the Chinese race, she is the high morale and general solidarity of the people... 'Too, the people are infinitely devoted to Generalissimo and...'

Madame Chiang Kai-Shek explained Miss Barber... As to the status of Western countries in the Orient, Miss Barber pointed out that the Japanese are placing pressure on the British to make them cease sending supplies to China by the Burma road... and that the French have been prevented from sending more supplies into China... French troops in China, but their boats are there to strike when the time is ripe... If the Japanese succeed in cutting off supplies from China over the Burma road the only other means for getting supplies into China will be by way of the Persian Gulf, but the Russians are now using to ship supplies into China... As to the part which the United States may play in the Far Eastern combat, Miss Barber stated that as long as the American fleet is stationed in the Pacific, Japan fears that the United States may think some more which will hinder Japan's actions... However, if the fleet should be moved to the Atlantic, Japan would probably make definite moves for the Indian East Indies and the Philippines, really making the United States case do about it... 'I do not think that the Chinese will actually be conquered,' said Miss Barber... 'The Chinese culture in the end will prove the strongest... All Japanese are not... they really make the United States case do about it...'

Rabbi Thurman States That Neo-Paganism Is Being Forced By Totalitarian Dictators

By MARGARET REITER "Rabbi Thurman of the United Hebrew Congregation of St. Louis, in his lecture on 'The Place of the Old Testament in the World Today' given in the College Assembly... made the impressive statement that neo-paganism is being forced upon us by the totalitarian dictators, and that this fact shows us the necessity of the Bible which, the Rabbi contends, is non-sectarian... Mrs. Jameson Opens Eighteenth Quarterly Child Guidance Clinic By Discussing Relation of Teacher to Mental Hygiene in the School

Opening the eighteenth quarterly Child Guidance Clinic, Mrs. Augusta Jameson, psychologist from the Chicago Institute for Juvenile Research, discussed the topic, "What Can Teachers Do to Assist with the Mental Hygiene in the School?"

Discussing the problem of maladjusted and mentally disturbed persons, Mrs. Jameson pointed out that according to the United States census there are more patients in mental hospitals than in all other hospitals combined.

Two other ways in which the teacher can help, Mrs. Jameson explained, are to keep an open mind; and to ease the limitations which the teacher has. Teachers should be willing to cooperate with agencies for psychological study, such as child guidance clinics.

WHAT IS THIS—A NEW WAY TO CATCH BUGS?



Hilmore Schmelzel of New Athens has certainly got himself in a difficult position over this little boxlike contraption. The little brown boxes that you have probably seen around the campus are not bug catchers, however. No! They are pin-hole cameras, constructed by the photography class which is a part of the summer recreational course.

The students receive a pin-hole camera kit, cut out various parts, glue them together, and the result is a camera. After hearing a lecture by Dr. J. Cary Davis, on construction and photographic technique, the students made pictures which are as good as many pictures taken by cameras with lenses.

Our government should build up defenses for our own welfare, but at the same time, it should establish an economy which is more balanced, so that the people will be more than willing to fight for something which is tangible, and not for a mere illusion.
