BOOK REVIEW

ASYLUM, by William Seabrook. Harcourt, Brace, and Company, 1935. Reviewed by Evelyn Miller.

When a well-known writer addicted to acute alcoholism voluntarily commits himself to a "mental hospital" (better known as an insane asylum) one may expect him to emerge with a wealth of interesting material.

BOOK REVIEW

PAPER ABELARD by Helen Vaidett. Reviewed by Elizabeth Lee Allen.

This is the kind of novel that improves on acquaintance. Its depths and significances cannot be discovered at a glance although it is so skillfully written that even the casual reader can get something from it.

The background, brimming with religious truth, portrays the ecclesiastical upheaval then in progress, the sauntings, the bigotry, the hypocrisy of men enjoying their own religious principles.

Letter Abelard is a man who has reached thirty-seven without having loved any woman. His innocence and virtue unusual in such an age, are, therefore, perhaps, his absorption in his literary studies in the cloister of Notre Dame in Paris.

His last attempt to revenge himself on Abelard is successful: he has arranged an Abelardian operation which has forced a man that he himself respects Abelard enters a monastery where he writes a book, considered heretical, for which his peers try and send him into perpetual seclusion from the world.

Although the photography of the book is as a whole excellent and better than it has been for the past few years, the one section which would have been made striking by good photography appears to be the unprofessional eye to have been poorly done.

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The 1936 Obelisk With a New Type Cover Design And Improved Typography, Now Issued

The 1936 Obelisk, featuring a modern, artistic cover design and the inclusion of several new departments, is now in the hands of the student body. The book, 229 pages in size, has been received with varying comments, most of which were enthusiastically in favor of the re-southernized news and ideas of the editor, Eileen Brook.

Perhaps the one feature of the book which attracted the most comment was the one depicting the activities of E. E. Pittoway, portraying in comic form activities of the typical student through a school year in this year, in particular. Cleverly conceived and entirely original in thought, the Pittoway drawings do great credit to the ingenuity of the artist, Kenneth Cooney. The best received portion of the book was undoubtedly judging from student comment, the Pittoway section.

Next to order of comment was the cover design. Unfortunately, a large part of the comment thereon was not favorable. The design was expressed that the design was "cheap," "gaudy" and "high-schoolish." Others liked the originality and the spirit of the design and believed it excellently portrayed the spirit of the college better than any commercial leather binding. One of the puzzling features of the cover, to the experienced eye, is the presence of the insight of Kappa Epsilon. The signature of the artist, Kenneth Cooney, in the mind of Obelisk designers is a whole, however, the cover design is fresh and striking. It rather "cheers." The change is refreshing, to say the least.

The book is dedicated this year to David S. McIntosh, head of the S. T. C. music department, in the words of the book, "for his untiring service in the musical activities of the school. His sacrifice here for his work and the zeal which it inspires has enriched the music department of which he is head."

The Obelisk is divided into four main sections, entitled College Activities, The Faculty and Features, The college section includes, of course, the same views of the S. T. C. campus which no Obelisk editor seems to do without. Among these, however, is one new and rather surprising picture of the Memorial tablet to the late President Henry William Shroyce, placed by the graduating class of 1935.
