M. J. SEGAL BACK ON THE CAMPUS

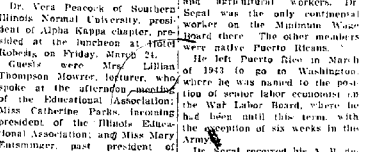
Dr. Melvin J. Segal, assistant professor of economics, has returned to SIU this term after his year's leave of absence. He has been very busy during the year, particularly by both students and faculty.

In March of 1942 he departed for Puerto Rico where he was chief economist of the Minimum Wage Board for one year. That year he was in the minimum wage in the sugar industry of Puerto Rico. The board took care of both industrial sugar workers and agricultural workers. Dr. Segal was the only continental economist on the Minimum Wage Board there. The other members were native Puerto Ricans.

He left Puerto Rico in March 1943 to go to Washington where he was named to the position of senior labor economist in the War Labor Board, where he has been for six weeks in the War Labor Board.

Dr. Segal received his A. B. degree from Amherst College and his M. A. degree and Ph.D. degree from the University of Illinois. He has been a member of the faculty since 1937 and remained here until he received government service. Dr. Segal has been a member of the National War Problems and International Economy.

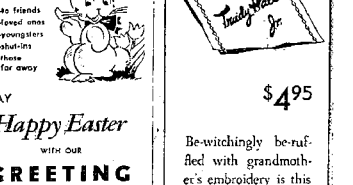
