Smoke Is Where You Find It

Did you ever wonder what club on Southern's campus had the most members and also the most loyal members?
The result of an extensive survey brought to light the little recognized institution—the Smokers Club, which meets outside the main gate at all times during the day.
It has been found that there are no particular qualifications for

membership, other than being able to run 50 yards, have a smoke and run back inside of ten minutes.
Meetings are very regular; most members appear at ten minutes until the hour. Some complete the whole hour if not having classes. Many subjects for discussion are used at each meeting, and discussions are not restricted to any one subject. Small groups may pick their own, the most popular

being co-ed, military life, and the activities of their instructors.
Pipe and cigar smokers usually hold individual discussions of their own because these smokers are different types of individuals from the cigarette smoker. Pipe smokers are usually found to be the tall, scholarly type, great thinkers, while cigar smokers are usually the jovial, stout gentlemen, addicted to heated discussions, such as politics and women drivers. These classes have been segregated because most cigarette smokers are the high strung, artistic type.
As yet, no officers have been elected, but plans are in the making to elect a president. The temporary qualifications are that he must be a long time smoker, familiar with the numerous brands, so as to be able to furnish an intelligent comment on questions regarding the use of tobacco. He must also be very versatile, in using pipe and cigar as well as cigarette.
Powerful lobbies have been set up. One of the strongest is found around the newspaper, using the influence of the press to bring campus smoking privilege. Others are working undercover in the president's office, in an effort to

provide benches for the smokers to sit on, and concrete and buckets for ashes and discarded cigarettes. A plan recently presented is for a smoke-house, to be constructed as near the gate as possible for the comfort of smokers in cold weather.
It has been suggested that dues be collected. Part of them will go to an insurance fund to cover any losses that might be involved when a smoker catches a fire while lighting up. Another part will be set aside to provide research in trying different types of tobaccos; reports of the merits of each will appear chalked on the sidewalk not less than once a week.
Meetings are highlighted time and again by many talented smokers. One blows a smoke ring into the air, then flips cigarette ash over the center of the ring. A skillful cigar smoker is able to extinguish two candles at once by forcing a stream of smoke through each nostril.
Contests are planned to be held at different intervals. Such feats to be tried are the flicking of cigarette butts both for distance and accuracy. Smoke ring tournaments are to be regularly held, and judging is to be made on the basis of ring diameter, number, and ability to hold shape for a length of time. Exercises in debate are included. The question to be resolved, "that Old Golds contain less nicotine than all other leading brands tested."
The club definitely frowns with disfavor upon smokers of both pipe and cigars and matches. At the present, the custom of women not smoking in public while standing up, excludes the feminine sex from the club.
The members are decidedly against such practices as the ambitious students working their way
