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Five Chairmen Needed For New Departments In Communications

An extensive search for persons to fill the five new chairmanship vacancies in the School of Communications is now underway.

The SIU Board of Trustees, at its meeting on June 29th, authorized a School of Communications with departments of Journalism, Printing and Photography, Radio-Television, Speech, Speech Correction, and Theater.

Chairmen for these new departments, existing Journalism, are in the process of being selected, and the positions are expected to be filled by July 1, 1957.

The School of Communications, under the direction of Dean C. Henton Talley, is now carrying out the normal channels of selecting the five chairmen.

Senior men being selected and questionnaires by Dean Talley in order to give him an indication of the steps to be taken before making his recommendation to the president's office.

"Consultation is being made at every level," Talley said, "before any type of recommendation will be made to the president's office."

The main problem confronting the selection of the chairmen is whether to fill the positions from within the present SIU staff, or whether to conduct a complete search throughout the field, including Southern's staff, to find the ideal men to fill the chairmanships.

No new courses will be offered as an immediate reaction to this division, although new and specialized courses are expected to be offered within a few years as the change takes place and the departments continue to grow.

The main advantage of the knowledge will be able to do more specialization by the individual student.

"A specialist with authority and know-how heading each of these new departments will be a great aid to the individual student majoring in that particular specialized field," Dean Talley stated.

After the questionnaires from the School of Communications staff members are returned to Dean Talley, he will confer with Willis G. Schmidt, Dean of Graduate School, and Dr. Charles D. Tenney, vice-president for instruction.

Following this, his official recommendation to the President's office will be submitted to be possible further amendments to the SIU Board of Trustees for final approval.

Rehabilitation Program Receives \$29,600 Grant

The newly formed SIU Rehabilitation counseling program has been selected as one of the 30 institutions of higher learning to receive a \$29,600 Teaching and Training grant from the U. S. Office of Vocational Rehabilitation.

The program, designed on a graduate level, is for the purpose of producing professionally trained workers who will be qualified to aid in the rehabilitation of the physically handicapped person.

Sixteen-hundred dollars of the grant will go to 10 graduate students who qualify for future training in the program.

The remainder will be used for extension purposes here on the SIU campus.

Essentially, the program is designed to give students a thorough preparation in the dynamics of human behavior and the methods common in all counseling activities in such that they may operate in any one of a number of settings in which a professional counselor is employed.

In order to be eligible for the new program the student must first meet the requirements of his particular Graduate School. An under-

graduate major in psychology is desirable for admission in the program, but students with heavy concentration in the social, biological, and educational sciences are also eligible for application.

Interested students should apply for admittance in the program at least two months prior to the quarter in which they wish to enroll.

SIU offers either of two degrees to the students who complete the graduate level course, a Master of Arts or Master of Science degree.

The M. S. degree is designed for the students who wish to discontinue their course of study at the sub-doctoral level and obtain more field experience in lieu of a thesis. The M. A. degree requires an experimental thesis, and it is a playing a Ph. D. degree.

The program, as currently set up, is similar to that of counseling psychology, and upon completion of the required course of study the individual is eligible for membership in the American Psychological Association.

A grant has been given to Dr. James Messersmith, education lecturer, by the United States Immigration Department.

Sates will be studied by Smith. He will visit all the major points of entry.

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On-Campus Students Over 6,000 Now

"Where are they going to put everyone?" seems to be the question about campus, and especially around the registrar's office this fall.

On-campus students numbered 6,056 at the close of registration Sunday, Sept. 29, which ended the first week of school.

Southern Illinois, after losing its Interstate Conference opener to Central Michigan, 32-13 last Saturday, is now in a third place tie with Northern Illinois, who finished last in 1955.

The Salukis played the Bradley Braves in a non-conference tilt last night at Peoria.

Leading the conference and tied for first place with Illinois Normal is Central Michigan, who has won for tied for the title every year since 1952.

Central and Normal, which edged Northern, last week, 34-0, both have won one game. Southern and Northern have each lost one game.

Western Illinois, Eastern Michigan, and Eastern Illinois have not yet played a conference game, but all swing into action this weekend.

Central Michigan tries to drop Northern still lower in the standings when the Chippewas invade DeKalb. Eastern opens its IAC play at home against Illinois Normal, now tied for first, and Western Illinois travels to Ypsilanti in the conference opener for both the Leathernecks and Eastern Michigan.

Sports In Spurts

Contributions to the drive to send SIU's veteran track coach Doc Lingle to the Olympics is nearing the \$500 mark, according to the SIU Alumni Service, which is serving as a clearing place for donations.

So far, more than 100 persons, clubs, and firms have given to the drive, which has a goal of \$1,000 to send Lingle to the November Olympics. One of the Olympic performers will be Phil Coleman, former SIU athlete, who will run in the 3,000 meter steeplechase.

After playing two games, winning one by a lopsided score and losing one the same way, statistics show Southern big behind opponents in total yards gained by rushing, passing, and first downs.

Southern has gained a total of 500 yards rushing and passing against its opponents' 591. Broken down, SIU has gained 455 yards rushing, compared with the oppositions' 488, and has gained 45 passing against opponent's 103. Southern has made 17 first downs, while the opponents have racked up 22.

In individual rushing statistics, Carver Shannon leads the way for the Salukis with 198 yards gained. However, he averages only 9.4 yards per carry, while teammate Ranette Lewis averages 10.8 yards per carry with 130 yards gained in 12 carries.

On the intramural side of the program, there will be swimming practice held between 6 and 7 p. m. tonight Oct. 5 and Oct. 8 from 4-5 p. m. Preliminaries will begin on Oct. 9 from 4 to 6 p. m., and the finals will be run off Oct. 10 from 4 to 6 p. m. No preliminaries will be held for diving. Suits and towels will be furnished. And entry blanks may be secured at the Intramural Office no later than Oct. 8.

There is still a big demand for officials of intramural sports. All who are interested are urged to secure rules at the Intramural Office and tests will be given individually. All officials are to be paid \$1.50 per contest.
