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Southern Meets Eastern, Macomb in Two Conference Tilts

Sheffer Returns to Squad; Team Loses Genesis; Both Games On Home Floor

Southern's basketball squad faced two conference loss this weekend as they play Eastern Teachers tonight and Macomb Teachers tomorrow. The Maroon and White lost its first conference game last week-end to Old Normal, 45-43. In spite of two bad breaks, the team variety has greatly exceeded all expectations in their fine showing against superior squads. The thriller at Old Normal was no small surprise and neither was the overtime loss to Cape Girardeau. These two teams have the advantage of Naval trainees from which to build their squads. The two breaks mentioned above are to be taken literally. At the beginning of the season, Don Sheffer, the only returning letter man, suffered a knee injury that has kept him out of competition until this weekend. He will make his return to the game in this week's contests. A second loss was felt by the squad when Barney Genesis, starting forward, fractured his leg in the game against Macomb on January 5. Genesis will be out for the rest of the season.

Charleston Tougher The game with Charleston will be the toughest of the two contests to date. The game on December 4 at the Eastern Homecoming, the Panthers defeated Southern 49-40, and Eastern has since defeated Macomb 56-40. The Panthers have two returning letter men in Andrew Sullivan, forward, and Charles McFord, guard. The other three starters, on the Panthers varsity are George Reed, Donald Higgins, and Howard Hayton. All three are freshmen. Charleston's record stands at 2-3. They have defeated George Field, Southern, and Macomb and have lost three games to Indiana State.

No Letterman There isn't a letter man on the Macomb Teachers squad. Offensive guard is Dick Todd, freshman center from La Harpe. Other first year men Coach Robert Barnwell has kept using include Merlin Hines, guard, Herbert, forwards, Guy Zimmerman and Bob Elinm, guards. So far this season Macomb has won all six games. The first four, they defeated Augustana 61, 54-42 and Illinois Wesleyan 58-38. There losses have been to Macomb 56-40, Southern 52-40, Nonmouth, 41-27, and Charleston, 56-40.

MID-TERM CLASSES SCHEDULED TO START JAN. 31

Instructions were given to the 60 volunteers, and campaign supplies were distributed.

The 'Mitate Men' volunteers are canvassing the township's residences, farms and business firms in an effort to secure the drive quota of \$24,100 for the Carbonate township before the end of the drive on February 15. The quota for the entire Jackson County is \$1,000,000.00. Mr. Albert Nicholas, principal of the Carbonate High School, is the chairman of the drive in the western part of the county. Persons are asked to give the amount of their purchase. The drive will take this order to the sales agency designated one of the local banks or the postoffice, and they will complete the transaction as soon as possible. Mitate Men will not handle cash or checks during the campaign. S.I.N.U. faculty members who buy bonds are urged to buy their bonds through the college business office so that the school will benefit from the purchase.

Efforts are being made not only to meet the quota, but to sell extra bonds to the public. It is hoped that many people who do not buy bonds will be induced to buy extra bonds in the drive. OVER 200 ATTENDEE HORTICULTURAL SOCIETY JAN. 17-18

On January 17 and 18 the seventh annual meeting of the Southern Illinois Horticultural Society was held at the campus of Southern Illinois Normal University. Approximately two hundred fruit growers from Illinois and Kentucky attended the first session on Monday morning when President H. E. Walkington presided. He called the opening session to order. Dr. V. W. Kelly, Associate Professor in Horticulture Extension, presided at the second session. L. Colvin, manager of the Illinois Fruit Growers' Exchange, spoke on Monday evening. The program was an attendance which is designed to bring the latest practical information to fruit growers. Dr. Kelly pointed out that the country needs all the fruit that can be produced, and that while the 1944 crop in Illinois could be increased largely by the production of better quality apples, that would be needed to produce a bumper crop this year. The supply situation is fully favorable for the production of apples with the exception of bushel baskets and possibly arsenate of lead. Bushel baskets, he warned, are scarce and will be likely to remain so if there is a normal crop this year. On Tuesday morning Dr. E. J. Johnston, State Superintendent of Emergency Food Labor, led a discussion of the labor problems of 1944.

Other speakers of the meeting included Dr. A. E. Marbeck, University of Missouri; Mr. N. E. McGraw, professor of horticulture, University of Kentucky; Mr. S. C. Chandler, Illinois Natural History Survey; Dr. M. J. Dorsey, head of the Department of Horticulture, U. S. C. O. Colby, and Dr. Dwight Pugh, University of Illinois. Dean C. M. Thompson of the College of Commerce and Administration of Illinois, and chairman of the Post-War Planning Commission was speaker at the annual banquet given on Monday night at the campus cafeteria. Mr. William Deacon of Tazewell, Ill. was the toastmaster.

CHICAGO SPECIALISTS WILL BE HERE FOR THE PSYCHOLOGICAL CLINIC

Thirty-second Quarterly Clinic conducted on this campus since April, 1936

The Illinois Institute for Juvenile Research and the college Bureau of Child Guidance are conducting a psychological clinic on the college campus on the Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday of next week. The clinic will be held in the Little Theater on Chicago. Dr. Sophie Schroeder, psychologist, who will interview the parents and the child and Mr. Robert Danzig, psychiatric social worker, who will discuss with the parents the developmental and social history of the child. The psychometrics will be in charge of Mrs. Douglas Parry, clinical psychologist with the college Bureau of Child Guidance. All three members of this staff will likewise participate in the seminars, and in the staffings.

Approximately 200 college students and faculty members attended the various sessions of the last clinic, which was the staffings, and seminars. An even larger attendance is expected at the clinic of next week. With more than eight hundred psychological clinics throughout the United States, progress is being made in aiding the child who has met with difficulties with school, home, and social adjustment. All children meet with many problems as they are growing up and developing. Parents and teachers have also come to realize the importance and the understandings they obtain through their conferences with the experts in child study and in the study of the adolescent.

Who Are the Cases Studied?

Only the children for whom arrangements have been made may be brought to the Winter Clinic. The services of the Institute are available to all students throughout the entire year, and communications for appointments may be sent to the director.

Special attention is being called to the Open Forum which will be conducted by the psychologist, Dr. Sophie Schroeder, on the topic, "Symptoms Indicating Maladjustment of the School Child or Adolescent." One-half of the time will be used to present facts relative to maladjustment and the remainder of the hour will be in the form of an open discussion. Open to everybody. 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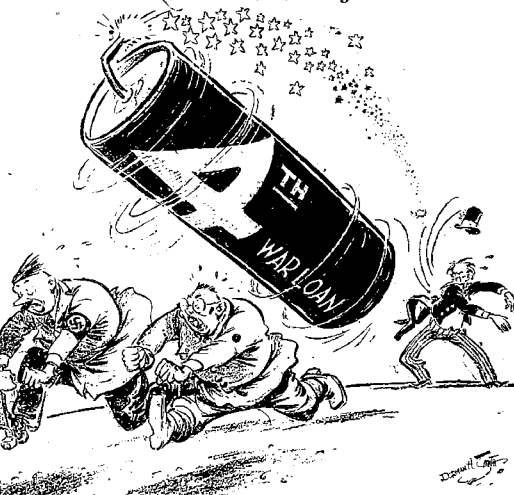

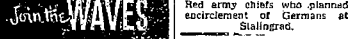

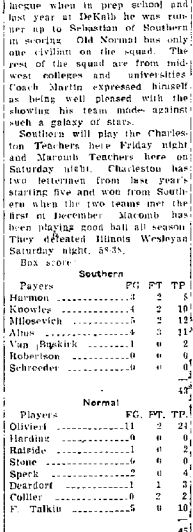
