## Melvin Launius Attends IRC National Meet

Melvin Launius, SIU junior, was a delegate of the Program Committee at the Association of International Relations Clubs' Meeting in New York City Dec. 6-11.

The meeting was held to plan the association of International Relations Clubs' conference in St. Louis, April 1-4, at which President Eisenhower, Adlai Stevenson, Edward R. Murrow and Senator W. V. Rothwell will speak on coexistence, according to Launius.

Launius, who was sent to New York by the U. S. Foreign Policy Association, attended meetings of the Assn. of IRC Clubs, Public Information Division of the United Nations and Program Department of the Foreign Policy Association.

He also was required to attend UN meetings as a delegate and talked to delegates Jacob Malik, Russia; Henry Cabot Lodge, Jr. U. S. and M. F. Jonali, Baghdad.

Launius will meet with the program committee Jan. 8 in St. Louis to further plan the Conference.

## Korean Vets To Get Checks Early - VA

Most veterans in school under the Korean GI Bill will get their monthly GI allowance checks before they go home for Christmas, under a pre-holiday speed-up system announced recently by the Veterans Administration.

Normally, VA sends the checks mailed around the 25th of the month. In December, however, many schools and colleges start their Christmas vacations on that date or earlier, so for that reason, VA will make every effort to get the checks out beforehand.

VA emphasized however that there may be some exceptional cases in which it may not be possible to make the payments ahead of time.

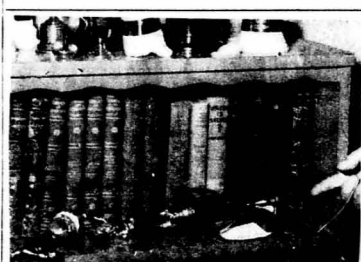
## Many Xmas Displays On Southern Campus

## Publisher Is Journalism Jobs Speaker

More efficient production methods are essential to preserving existing small newspapers, Edward Lindsay, Decatur, told an SIU "Jobs in Journalism" audience Tuesday evening.

Lindsay is editor of the Lindsay-Schaub Newspapers and publisher of the Southern Illinoisian. Other newspapers in the group include the Decatur Herald and Review, the Urbana Courier, and the East St. Louis Journal. The "Jobs in Journalism" meetings are sponsored periodically at SIU by the Journalism Department and the Journalism Students Association.

He suggested that the economics of the small newspaper should be of special concern to the SIU Journalism department and there are many small weekly and daily papers in the area.

Lindsay said there has been a significant shift in attitudes of present day editors from ideas of the last century thought could only be found in the newspaper editor under the guidance of a good city editor.

The Lindsay-Schaub newspapers require persons seeking first jobs in editorial or advertising departments to have a college degree, he said. Starting salaries are 37 percent higher and the apprenticeship shorter if applicants have journalism degrees from accredited schools.

Singing soldiers who became an all-veteran chorus after World War II will perform in Shrock Auditorium at 8 p. m. Jan. 7 under the direction of Leonard De Paur.

The concert is sponsored by the Carbondale Community Concert Association.

The De Paur Infantry Chorus, which has given more than 3,000 performances, started with close harmony in barracks at Fort

Div. N. J., and ended as a morale unit to entertain war troops in the Pacific.

At the end of the war, Capt. De Paur encouraged the men to stay together. The chorus toured Europe nine months before returning to the States to continue choral work in civilian life.

Personal has changed through the years and now includes Korean veterans. Every member of the chorus is a college graduate.

De Paur started his musical career as a singer in the Hall Johnson Negro Choir while also studying at Columbia University by day and working as a red cap at Pennsylvania State, by night. He later became musical director of the Negro Theatre under the Federal Theatre Project in New York. He organized and directed the Air Force show, "Winged Victory."

The SIU Foundation has been given a \$10,000 from the estate of the late Mrs. Leah M. Reef of Carbondale.

Edward V. Miles, SIU business manager and treasurer of the Foundation, said the money had been turned over by Elmer Teague, executor of Mrs. Reef's estate, for a Leah M. Reef Memorial Scholarship.

Mrs. Reef, who died last December, was president of the Carbondale Public Library board of trustees from 1922 until 1952. She gave more than \$50,000 in cash and property to the library.

Miles said the executive committee of the Foundation and the University's Scholarship and Loans Committee had agreed on a plan whereby the \$10,000 would be placed in an endowment fund, the income to be used for awarding one scholarship a year.

R. Long, SIU Journalism department chairman, announced today. Waring will begin a three-day stay at SIU Jan. 26, speaking to journalism classes and conferring with students. He will speak at 10 a. m. in freshman assembly.

THE COLORADO EDITOR will receive the Elijah P. Waring has published the Littleton Independent, only newspaper in the community of nearly 35,000, for more than a quarter of a century. The town is 12 miles south of Denver. His weekly paper concentrates on local news and discusses state, national, and international news from the local angle.

"I'VE NEVER CATALOGUED myself as a liberal," he says, "but I expect I take a 'liberal' position 98 per cent of the time. Most people here in Littleton, and I suspect elsewhere as well, don't have ideologies. They raise a family and try to keep the roof from leaking. The Independent is edited for them."

Normal, which shared fourth place with Western Illinois in league play in 1953-54, owns victories over Quincy, Manchester, Iola College, and Indiana Central. Redbird losses were to De Paul and Millikin.

The Salukis stepped off on the strong foe against Millikin, losing 82-62, and couldn't find a stride the next two outings, falling to Mississippi State 72-69 and Midwestern University 81-70.
