The curtain in Shryock Auditorium will open on the first act of Gertrude Tonkony's "Three Cornered Moon" at 8 o'clock tomorrow evening. Strut and Fret Little Theatre is offering this three act comedy of the "moonstruck Rimplegars" as its major production of the year. The combined efforts of stage technicians, business staff, troupers, and director during the past six weeks will culminate in a finished and agreeable production. The play is one with varied enough appeal to suit any type of audience. More sophisticated players should find ample wit and conversation of the Rimplegars, while lovers of simple, human drama will be amazed at the skill with which the piece leaps from farce to comedy, from satire to sentiment.

"Three Cornered Moon" Really Happens
Little Theatre has chosen a play that makes the audience feel that the action not only can happen but is happening every day of the year. Miss Tonkony is an author who takes her audience by the hand and leads them into the very heart of family life. The line between tranquility and uproarousness is indeed a slender one in the Rimplegar household. But the general feeling is that of witnessing the antics of a wholesome and charming group of human beings.

But the play is not wholly one of irrelevances. Faced with bankruptcy, meditated suicide, and a love triangle that defies solution, the Rimplegars are prepared to give their audience swift moving scenes packed with tensely and emotion.

Bauman Designs Set
The technical staff has been not less busy in preparing for the forthcoming production. Under the direction of Karl Bauman the technicians have worked out a unique cross section of a home interior. This arrangement will allow the audience to witness simultaneously the action in two different rooms of the home.

Other members of the stage crew are John McDonald, Albert Hamilton, and Barbara Jane Scott. Stage properties are in the charge of Frances Noel and Mrs. Elnora Baumgardner, while the business staff includes Robert Charness, Allan Buchanan, and Frances Noel. Dr. C. H. Cramer is in charge of ticket sales, and general publicity. Douglas Rimplegar, a member of the cast, has aided Miss Julia A. Jomah in directing the rehearsals.

C. J. Thomas Speaks To Agriculture Club on Corn-Hog Program

The Agriculture club had its guest and speaker C. J. Thomas, local representative for the Government's Agriculture Adjustment Act, at its regular meeting last Thursday. Mr. Thomas spoke on the corn and hog adjustment program for 1935. He centered his talk upon the need for a corn and hog program.

Reviews Industrial Conditions

He began by reviewing the conditions of all industries during and immediately following the World War. "After the war was ended, Europe, which was previously a great buyer of American products, could no longer buy and the result was the crash of '29. Immediately there was an over-supply of products from all industries. The manufacturers met this situation by reducing the supply. They quit manufacturing but held their prices to an inflexible level, whereas the farmers kept on producing and since their prices could not be held to an inflexible level, the prices for farm commodities fell 63 percent. To remedy this condition there was only one thing to do—curtail production."
"The Government, seeing that the farmers would not do this if it were left to their own initiative, took upon itself the provision of an adequate and suitable adjustment program." He further stated that this program was not at all compulsory. "It was devised only for those who wanted to take advantage of the opportunity," he said.

MAROONS CLOSE COURT SCHEDULE NEXT TUESDAY

St. VIATOR TO BE OPPONENTS IN LAST GAME; MEET CHARLESTON FRIDAY

Southern Illinois Teachers College basketballs close their 1934-35 schedule when they tangle with the St. Viator College Green Wave here Tuesday night. In the next to the last game and in what should be one of this year's hardest fought battles, the Eastern Illinois Teachers College Panthers will engage the Maroons Friday night. The Charleston game will be in the nature of an attempt at revenge on the part of the Southerners, whereas the Easterners will be trying to win the second annual two-game series for their first clean sweep since 1932.

The Southerners were defeated, 39-35 in a previous encounter this year at Charleston, largely as a result of rugged floor play and the added handicap of a small court. Much credit, however, must be given to the wide-awake playing and alert defense work of the Springfield Panthers.

E. I. Attack Strong
The Panthers were led in their attack by Howard Ballard, flashy forward, who scored nine points against the Maroons in the first game. Against the Maroons, however, Joe Curry, Ballard's running mate, and the other forward backed paced the Panther sharpshooters with six field goals. Shaw, center, and Max Detro, fiery guard, each scored seven points. The fifth member of the usual starting quintet is Mac McClain, a very capable partner to Detro as guard. Excellent substitutes for the Panthers are Tedrick and Brown. It is probable that the Panther attack will be strengthened by the return of "Joker" Jones, who was injured, and by the recovery of Howard Ballard, who has only recently recovered from an attack of pneumonia.

In general, the Panthers have a fast and hard style of attack and defense featuring close guarding and a fast breaking offense.

In conference play this season, the Panthers have been rather inconsistent, having won three games and lost four. They hold two victories over Shurtleff and one over Carbondale, and have lost to Old Normal and to McKendree.

Charleston's terrific scoring power is demonstrated by its 105-27 massacre of the Jonesboro (Arkansas) Baptist College basketballers.

On the basis of scores of previous years, the Maroons rate as slight favorites. Since 1921, the two colleges have met to renew their basketball rivalry twenty-eight times, with the Maroons victorious in eighteen encounters. The Panthers, before winning the first of this year's series, had last lost victory in 1932. The Southerners seem to be particularly dangerous on their home court, having won nine of the thirteen contests played on the Carbondale floor.

Second Meeting With Viator
The closing contest of the season brings the St. Viator Green Wave to Carbondale for the first time this year and the second time in S. I. T. C. cage history. The only previous meeting with the Maroons in last year when the Maroons drubbed them, 49-20. The Viator squad is well sprinkled with new players, most of

State Convention Here May 3, 4

Mu Tau Pi press conference for high school students of Jackson and contiguous counties is the first of two newspaper conclaves to be conducted at S. I. T. C. this spring. The second meeting is that of the Illinois College Press Association, Friday and Saturday, May 3, 4. At this meeting delegates from the publications of the twenty-six colleges in the state association, with the state director, R. K. Barlow of the school of journalism at the University of Illinois, will assemble for their annual work sessions, social functions, and business meeting.

The state convention is being planned under the supervision of Charles Noel, president of I. C. P. A., and Harrison Eaton, secretary and treasurer. These students were elected to state office at the convention held at Dekalb last spring.

Approximately eighty high school students are expected to assemble for the second annual conference in April under the auspices of Mu Tau Pi. This number attended the first conference sponsored by the honorary journalist fraternity last year. It is likely that more than 100 delegates will come to S. I. T. C. for the convention of the Illinois College Press Association in May.

Meeting to Discuss S.I.T.C. Intramural Baseball Leagues

Definite indication of the continuation of the usual S. I. T. C. intramural baseball program is contained in an announcement of a meeting for all men interested in intramural baseball competition, to be called some time in the first week of the spring term. At this meeting organization plans will be discussed, and the schedule will be arranged. Play in the diamond part will begin the first week in April weather and turf permitting. The announcement was made by Dr. Richard L. Beyer, member of the athletic committee, and commissioner of the contemplated league.

KATHRYN COLYER WINS SCHOLASTIC HONORS

Miss Kathryn Colyer, daughter of Professor and Mrs. J. B. Colyer, was one of twelve students in the college of Education at the University of Illinois who, during the past semester, made the highest possible average in scholarship. Miss Colyer received a grade of A in each of her courses.

APPROPRIATION LISTED IN AMENDMENT BEFORE BOARD

The board took no definite action on the stadium project yesterday, but the plan has met no opposition.

Formal construction plan for an S. I. T. C. athletic stadium were approved Monday by Captain William McAndrew, Athletic Director. The plans were drawn up and submitted by E. W. Cox, West Frankfort engineer. The \$300,000 appropriation is now before the board as an amendment to the college budget, and will, in all probability, be approved. In that case, only ratification of the college budget by the state legislature would be necessary to insure a beginning being made on the project. In the event of unreserved ratification of the budget, as is most likely, work will begin on the plant sometime before fall. Before actual labor begins the plans must be finally approved by the state architect, and the financing arrangements must be completed. Financing will be partly by P. W. A. funds, with S. I. T. C. pairing off funds with federal aid.

At the same time the stadium plans were approved, tentative plans for an S. I. T. C. swimming pool annex, to be added to the present gym, were submitted to Mr. Cox. This proposal is in the most nebulous form at present, and probably will not be pressed further within the year.

Seating Accommodations For 4,250

The stadium plans provide for a concrete structure, to be built on the west side of the new athletic field. The stadium will seat 4,250 people, and underneath the seats will be dressing quarters, showers, and locker rooms for home and visiting teams. To reduce the cost, the seats will be laid out in men's rest-rooms, concession booths, and ample storage space. The structure will be 331 feet long, and will be set back six feet from the running track. The seating arrangement calls for twenty-one tiers of wood-surfaced concrete seats, accessible from five entrances. Another feature of the edifice is the twenty-eight foot long passageway on the top row, and containing complete press accommodations. In all, there will be sheltered rooms, two of which are forty-five feet long by twenty-four wide. Two others are twenty-nine by twenty-four feet. The entire building will be steam heated, and will be ventilated by modern means. Through drainage will also be provided for, by channels under the seats. The stadium will be, attractively architected, and completely utilitarian in every detail.

Swimming Pool Indefinite

The swimming pool project, in the preliminary stages only, calls for a proposed outlay of \$250,000. The amount would cover the construction costs of an annex to the east side of the gymnasium, including a twenty-five by thirty-six foot pool, and two eighty by forty auxiliary gymnasiums, built at either end of the pool. The annex would be eighty feet wide, would extend the entire length of the gym, 160 feet, and would be set out twelve feet from the east wall. In the proposed building there are two floor levels. On the upper are the two gyms, one for men and

Several forfeits were chalked up in both leagues, as the Kings and the Kings of Egypt were dropped out of further play after exceeding the one forfeit game limit.

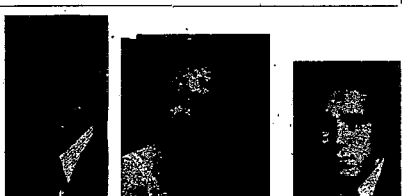
First Division Teams Shaver Hot turned up in a bumper winning four games to tie into the second place tie group in the National circuit.

 the other for women, and the swimming pool surface. On the lower floor are a 100 yard practice running track and several class rooms and storerooms. The auxiliary gymnas would provide additional room for physical education classes, for basketball competition, and for gymnastic equipment.

In addition to the gym and pool, there would be shower and dressing room facilities for men and women. There is also the possibility of class room space under the gymnasiums. The pool itself would have a maximum depth of ten feet, and would be uniformly graded to a four foot depth.

State Aid Necessary
 If the proposition is to become a reality in the future, funds must come from state allocation under the Federal Works Appropriations Bill, now before the Senate. Hence, the whole project is uncertain at present. In any event, however, the step taken marks a definite beginning toward including a natatorium in the athletic facilities of S. I. T. C.

The two projects, one almost a certainty, the other at least a possibility in the future, continue the general physical improvement carried on tirelessly by the administration. Through the ceaseless efforts and labor of President H. W. Shryock and Captain McAndrew, S. I. T. C. is again enabled to move forward and justly claim recognition as one of the nation's most progressive colleges.

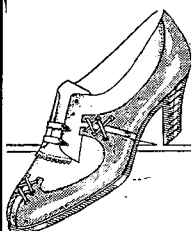
