Lest They Forget

Next year will be an impor-tant year for SIU — the legisla-tive year. SIU's diplomats will be loaded with stacks of statistics, reports and reasons why the school will need a larger appro-priation. The huge building pro-gram SIU has underway will probably need several millions, plus increased operating expenses. Just what SIU's building needs are is not in dissure, but in

are is not in dispute, but in which order they should be built which order they should be built is a certain point of controversy. Some would argue that we need-ed a new library before we need-ed the present University School building. This faction would probably point out that a library would serve a greater number of students.

students.

However, it must be said that the Legislature must be considered also. Very often state institutions must take buildings of relatively secondary importance rather er than more vital needs because the Legislature disagrees with institutions on what is vital and what is not. And of course it would be foolish to turn down appropriated money—a practice

appropriated money — a practice never followed in public life. At last something has been done about student housing, a sadly neglected phase of the University in previous years. Whether it was the administration's fault or the Legislature's is a thing of the past. The first phase of the program has materialized in Woody Hall. SIU as plans for mew men's downs next year. But in this rush for more Uni-versity housing let us hope the administration has not overlook-ed the need for a SIU fratternity-sorrity zow. Although f ew would argue that the need for this type of housing is greater than for dormitories, it very definitely would add a great deal to the

would add a great deal to the campus.

Aside from the fact of improving excellent housing for 300-400 students it would immeasurably improve the appearance of the campus. The most impressive buildings on the campus of most exchools are the fratternity and sorrority houses. These buildings on the campus of most schools are the fratternity and sorrority houses. These buildings house the social backbone of the student body.

At Southern the Greek houses are sad indeed when compared to those of many smaller schools. The fratternity-sorririty system is not entirely so strong as it should be. A relatively small percentage of SIU students belong to these groups. Perhaps new houses

would be a shot in the arm to the Greeks and also provide an incentive for many organized houses to go Greek. And for those wo do not choose to do so, there would still be adequate Uni-

there would still be adequate University lousing.

For the cost of an estimated 1,000,000 the school could build a fraternity-storoity row. State funds used for the project would amount to less than half the cost, and bonds could be floated for the remainder.


