# Council Business? Budget, Reason? No Quorum

The old adage of "no quorum" prevented the Student Council from acting on any motions in the meeting held last Thursday night.

Four members were absent and were had to leave early from the meeting, and as a result most of the time was reduced to the "discussion without action" stage.

Absent were senior representatives Dale Cozad and Gary Heape. Cozad was the co-chairman of the Theta Xi Variety Show and was busy in the preparation of that event. Heape, who arrived at the meeting but was then excused, was also missing because of the Theta Xi Show.

Bertha King, junior representative, was absent because of illness. Dan Bode, sophomore, and Tom Piper, VII representative, were merely unaccounted for.

The Council did carry on a great deal of routine business.

**Constitution Committee Meets**

Bill Berry, sophomore representative, reported that the constitution committee of the Council had met with the presidents of various organizations of campus to discuss the proposals for the new constitution.

The meeting was the first of many to be held with students in consideration of the constitution. Berry termed the initial get-together a "highly successful meeting."

He said that the presidents of the various living centers had given backing to the constitution proposal.

The sophomore also said the committee had written letters to the student governments of the University of Illinois and of the Uni-

versity of Wisconsin asking them to forward copies of their school constitutions.

The next meeting of the constitution committee has been set for this Thursday at 10 p.m. in the conference room of the office of the graduate school.

Bill Berry reported that the treasury balance stood at \$792.28, with a check for the UNSNA taking a big chunk out of the previous week's balance.

**Seniors Approve Petition**

The Social Senate, added Berry had approved several petitions at its meeting, and had tabled the problem of the Senate policy regarding funds to newly organized campus organizations.

Yvonne Anton announced from the Southern States Council that the Cheerleaders were looking for a new sponsor.

**Others Avoid 'Speed Traps' Survey Shows 1 Of 4 Cars Speed Through Chautauque; Others Disregard Stop Signs**

Results of a traffic survey were discussed in the Monday night Chautauque Housing Project Council meeting held in the Project's nursery.

The survey, conducted by Chautauque residents, was taken on three consecutive Thursdays after an excessive amount of traffic violators were noted in the Project.

Included in the survey was the number of cars exceeding the 10 mph speed limit, the ones disobeying stop signs, and vehicles that swerved to one side of the road to avoid the "speed traps."

Approximately 450 cars a day were counted during through the Project. Of these, 100 were speeding, 75 did not halt or slow down for stop signs. No accurate count was made of the cars that avoided the "speed traps," although the council reported that the number was "very high."

"One of the violators was a campus policeman," a member of the council said. "He was seen speeding, and was reported going very fast."

Another resident told this reporter that, "some children were playing in the road one day and a car came by and didn't even try to slow down."

Carol Ferree, whose husband, Bernard, is a junior agriculture major from Mattoon, said that "the Chautauque residents are at fault too. You can't blame it all on someone else."

"It's really a serious situation, and something has to be done," added Carol, the council's secretary.

Vice-Mayor Bill Allen, a junior education major, asked if the council could call on the Civilian Defense committee. Jim Aaron, CD chairman, outlined ten points the committee thought would improve the CD in the Project.

The ten point plan, which the council accepted is:

1. Survey the project to determine the availability of trained or practical nurses and individuals that are trained in first-aid.
2. Assign block leaders.
3. Find the number of station wagons and trucks that would be available for evacuation.
4. Determine the number of safe places where Residents may go to find first-aid supplies and adequate bedding.
5. Organize an auxiliary patrol to protect looting while evacuating.
6. Obtain surplus property such as raincoats, flashlights, bedding and other necessities.
7. Determine fire protective resources of the Project.
8. See that the main gas and electric line are turned off during evacuation and that residents do the same in individual apartments.
9. Organize an orientation program for new residents and outline policies and evacuation procedures.
10. Determine need and means of assisting women and children in the evacuation in the absence of the husband.

All DePutra, councilman from Park 5, said he would outline a few ways of preventing looters that was mentioned in point five of the plan. Bill Holz suggested that another sign could be installed in the Project. The one sign in the Project now cannot always be heard by all residents. The council said nothing definite could be presently decided on a second sign.

The next council meeting was set for March 3.

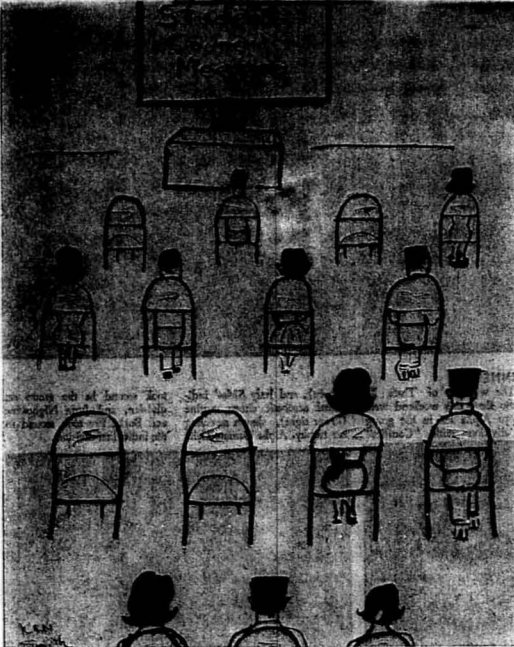

## Navy Life At Sea Is Good For 'Mister Roberts'

Now hear this! Now hear this! Ever wonder what life in the Navy is like 5000 miles from the enemy? A relatively large crowd found out last Friday night when the Movie House screening of "Mister Roberts" got underway.

The problems encountered by the crew of the "USS Reluctant," a cargo ship operating in the Pacific during World War II, were probably not typical of all such crews, but they were highly entertaining just the same. Most of the problems seemed to rise from the crew's remarkable aversion to work and their constant feud with the captain.

Henry Fonda turned in an excellent performance in the title role, as the go-between who always managed to come between captain and crew, sometimes to the captain's discomfort—he had a habit of becoming sick at his stomach when angry. Fonda managed to bring just the right note of seriousness to the whole movie, and added a few serious thoughts to what might otherwise have been a mediocre comedy and nothing else. The balance between seriousness and hilarity was carefully nursed.

As the captain, James Cagney was also excellent. The tactics which made him famous as one of the greatest screen gangsters were not at all out of place in his portrayal of the tyrannical, comical little captain, obsessed with the care of a rather sickly-looking ported palm on the bridge and a good healthy dislike for the entire crew.

The chief scoundrel of the movie, however, was Jack Lemmon, as brash and scatter-brained Ensign Pulver, the role for which he won an Academy Award. Lemmon is one of the funniest men to come around in some time, and he aptly gave him plenty of opportunity to prove it. As a fellow who could smell the presence of females a mile away, invent a firecracker which really blew up the ship and manage to evade the captain for a full fourteen months of duty, he was hilarious.

William Powell turned in his usual splendid performance as the

sympathetic ship's doctor who furnished the straight alcohol for social occasions, and the rest of the cast also turned in creditable performances.

Directed by John Ford and Mervyn Leroy and based on the prize-winning play by Thomas Heggan and Joshua Logan, "Mister Roberts" was a complete, unqualified success.

## One Debater Gets Second

Ted Foster of the SIU squad placed second in the individual debate awards at the Northwestern University—Owen Coon debate tournament at Evanston the past weekend. A total of 192 debaters participated in the contest. First place speaker award went to Philip Hubbard of the Augustana de debate championship at West Point last April. Hubbard received 80 points out of a possible 90 while Foster had 79. Three other debaters in the tournament also received individual medals.

The debate team of Ted Foster and Ray Canterbury reached the quarterfinal round in the tournament before being eliminated by Washburn University by a 3-2 decision. The tournament attracted many of the outstanding debate teams in the nation as 50 colleges and universities from 18 states participated. In addition to the national champions from Augustana, 10 other universities which carried bids to the West Point national also attended the Northwestern competition.

In the preliminary rounds, Canterbury-Foster defeated Wayne State University, Brooklyn College, Hamline College, John Carroll University from Cleveland, and Augusta (not the same debaters who won the national title). Their only preliminary loss was

to Emporia State College. Southern's other debate team at the Northwestern Tournament, Marsha Wiehn and Regina Miller won 3 and lost 3.

Five SIU teams will participate in the Emporia State College tournament in Kansas this weekend. In addition to the Foster-Canterbury and Wiehn-Miller teams, Southern will be represented by Robert Holton-Richard Hunsaker, Kent Brandon-Gary Bengtson, and Keith Sanders-Guilverne Kopp. (Southern was forced to cancel its entries in the Purdue novice tournament last weekend due to the illness of one of the debaters).

Southern's wrestling team has five men still undefeated for the season.

Southern is tied for third place in the IIAAC basketball race with a 4-3 conference record.

## Cagers Run Win Streak To Four In Row, Then Lose Big Game To Northern Illinois

Southern's basketball squad moved into second place in the IAC temporarily last Thursday night as they dived Eastern Illinois, 74-66, but moved right back out when they blew their big chance and lot to Northern Illinois at DeKalb Saturday night.

In Thursday night game, the Salukis pulled out to an early 19-13 lead with about 11-minutes gone. Tom McGreal, 6-6 freshman, had 12 of the first 19 points.

Seymour Bryson having one of his worst games in the last two years, left the game with about three minutes to play in the first half with four fouls.

With about one minute left in the game, Southern held a slim 67-66 lead and Eastern had the ball. Sunny Duane was up to the occasion though as he stole the ball and went in for the lay-up to break the game open.

The victory, which was the fifth in a row at home for the cagers, kept their close clean and ran the home win streak to seven in a row including the last two games last season.

Saturday night at Northern Illinois, the Salukis, fighting with the Huskies for second-place, went foul happy as they committed 32 fouls.

Southern simply couldn't keep up with Northern's fast breaking ball game and were forced to foul to try to stop them. As a result, five SIU players fouled out giving Northern 52-free-throw attempts. The Huskies made 40 of them good.

Seymour Bryson led the Salukis with 16 points. Newsome, who had 18 against Eastern, had 14 today and Bill Roberts had 13.

Tom McGreal, leading scorer in Thursday night's contest with 21 points, had 10.

Larry Wyllie, the IAC's leading scorer, led Northern with 34 points.

Southern held an early lead in the Northern game, but Northern quickly closed the gap at 24-24 and went out in front. By half-time they were leading 46-37. The Huskies held as much as an 18 point lead in the second half.

Southern played at Beloit last night in a non-conference game.

All of these SIU wrestlers remain undefeated for the season.

### Tough One

#### Swimmers End Win Streak, Lose To Loyola, 54-32

Southern's swimming team failed in their attempt last Friday to protect an unshared home record that covered a span of two years, as they fell to Loyola University, 54-32.

Undefeated at home in the last two years, the Salukis simply didn't have it and were never ahead in the meet which was the last home meeting of the year for the swimmers.

Loyola took the first event, the 400y. medley relay, as they set a 4:18.6, 2.2 seconds under the pool record. Loyola nosed out Southern in the event by about one foot to jump off to a 7-0 lead.

Joe Barry, one of the best swimmers in the team's short history, grabbed a first in the 50yd. dash as he nosed out Roy Van DeWalle of Loyola with a time of 24.9.

The fancy diving event was no contest as Roger Council walked off with first place honors. Council thrilled the small crowd with his final dive of a double summerault with a full twist. His outstanding point total was 254.3 points.

The Salukis took only one other first in the meet. Bob Montgomery won the small crowd with the 440y. freestyle with a time of 5:30.5. At this point Southern was down only 39-31 but Loyola's two first in the last two events, dampened any hope of victory for the Salukis.
