## PERSONALITY SKETCH

It has been said that a chin is not as strong as the neck. If one could be fashioned and set as a staple in comparison with Southern and its many personalities, it would be my opinion that S. I. N. U. is indeed a vibrating chin with link strength and links in the neck.

One of many outstanding examples is the noted Mrs. John Allen of the S. I. N. U. Museum. He was born in Hamilton, near the village of Prosperity, in the recently closed school, in the town known as "Hardacre" because of the difficulty of organizing a school district. In 1907, at the age of eighteen years, he passed a county superintendent examination to teach and became the first teacher at the Walsh school of northern Galatia. In the spring of 1908 he came to S. I. N. U. as a teacher at the first year Junior College offered at that time. In 1910 Mr. Allen became an instructor at his former alma mater, the Gibson school, of "Hardacre" in Saline county.

In 1912 he became principal of the Phillips School in Saline county, remaining there until 1915, at which time he transferred his principalship to the Taylor school at Horseburg. Being a member of the Teachers Association of this county, and when our country entered in World War I he volunteered for service and was sent overseas in 1918 with the 46th Regiment of Infantry. As a member of this regiment he participated in the Champagne and Meuse Argonne drives and was stationed on the Rhine in the Army of Occupation. During this occupation he was awarded an one of five medals from S. I. N. U. for his participation in the war.

Among his other deeds of merit to Southern Mr. Allen has done much in the way of public relations and has been instrumental in forming many of our various groups and in the way of teaching and in the way of public relations. 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## SIX PRESIDENTS HAVE GUIDED SOUTHERN TO ITS PRESENT RENOWN

At this time, when our president is contemplating himself to his new tasks, it is worthwhile that we look back at the six presidents who have guided Southern to its present renown.

The first man to become president of S. I. N. U. was Mr. Robert Allen, in the year 1924. He was a descendant of the best New England stock and was a member of the Methodist churches. He was a retired from active labor as a head of the school, after a successful career of 18 years as an art first president.

The second president was Mr. John Hill, M. A. He was a native of the state. He was a professor of mathematics in the State Normal from which he had graduated in 1913. He became a member of the faculty of the Department of S. I. N. U. Mr. Hill presented the exhibit of S. I. N. U. in the World's Fair in Chicago, "This Country's Greatest Achievement" in 1933. He had brought to S. I. N. U. his own worldwide fame. Professor Hill remained only one year as president.

The third president was Dr. E. E. Everett, M. A., LL. D., a native New Yorker. He was forced to leave Chicago College in West Virginia because of his political views. He presided in many pulpits throughout Southern Illinois during his presidency. He was a member of the American Philosophical and Science Institute, and was elected to the campus during his administration. He was a member of the Phi Kappa Phi Honor Society.

## A VICTORY OVER NORMAL WOULD MAKE SOUTHERN ONE OF MIDWEST'S BEST TEAMS

Coach "Abe" Martin and his Maroons open up their Illinois Intercollegiate Athletic Conference game schedule here Saturday night when they play host to Illinois State Normal of Bloomington.

Old Normal has won only three games out of ten already played this season, whereas Southern has won six out of seven. Normal's last defeat was at the hands of a strong Great Lakes squad, 67-59, Tuesday night. It is interesting to note that both Southern and Normal beat Indiana State by the same score, 65-53.

Normal has among their squad two former all-Illinois State centers, Ronnie Schaefer and Robert Campbell, who played for Lansing Center two years ago. Other members of the team are Gerald Riser, T. E. Adams, and George Madigan. Martin will probably start his regular lineup of Sheffer, Cabell, Milosevich, Harmon and Foley. If the locals win this game they will not only become favorites for the I.A.C. championship, which Old Normal has held for three years, but will be accepted as one of the Midwest's strongest teams.

An interesting sidelight on Normal's night game is that Normal will present a Carbonade boy in its lineup against Southern. He is Warren Day, who was graduated from Carbonade Community High School last year and who is now a Navy trainee at Normal. In high school he was voted one of the Class of 1944.

## S.I.N.U. DEFEATS EVANSVILLE BASKETBALL SQUAD, 68-52

Southern clinched up their first win in the 1944-45 season last Friday night defeating Evansville College, 68-52.

During the first ten minutes of the first half both teams played an equal, but before the half ended Southern had rolled up a comfortable lead of 27-7.

Evansville attempted a brief comeback in the last period, counting within two baskets of the locals, but again the Maroons were ahead to lengthen their lead.

Sam Milosevich led the Maroons in scoring with 21 points. He sank eleven free throws and eight lay ups. Don Staehler was next in line with 12 points.

Although the locals outplayed their opponents in individual play, they did not as a team outplay Evansville for the speedy tempo work of the Hoosier crew, which featured fast break plays, thrilling fast tempo throughout the game.

Evansville was playing without the services of their captain, six-foot-four-inch center and second high jumper, Dick Groden, who was induced into military service Thursday before the game.
