**BLUEPRINT FOR  
WORLD TRADE**

The whole process of world trade is undergoing review by governments, industries, and by the people. Much of the discussion has been centered around "tariffs," a word which means a "combination to control production and fix prices." In the heat of public discussion that "tariffs" but world trade is in danger of becoming the synonym of "secrets," "un-American," "contracts with foreigners."

As one American enterprise which has done business all over the world, to the benefit of American consumers and the nation as a whole, we should like to state our position.

Here are our views:

1. We do not believe in controlling production—whether it is done by government fiat or by business men behind the locked

doors of board rooms. When there seems to be over-production, it is the American "Way" that is the cause of the trouble. For the product, to improve the methods of distribution so that people can share what is being produced at a lower cost.

As Justice Brandeis once said: "The one final way in which we can improve the conditions of life is to produce more, in order that there may be more to divide."

Like most responsible American corporations, we are dedicated to the American Way.

We think there is one notable exception to this general rule—namely, the practice of hoarding to waste or use up a natural resource. Then, we think it is the responsibility of government

to be the agent of all the people—to step in and stop unwise depletion of these irreplaceable resources.

The American people have already accepted the validity of this principle. The oil-producing states of the Union, with the approval of Congress, have established the Inter-State Oil Compact for the purpose of conserving the nation's oil resources.

Under this Compact, the governing authorities of Texas, for example, fix—in open public hearings—quotas for the production of oil within the State.

2. We do not believe in combinations to control price. Quite aside from any moral principle involved, we think it is folly for a business to believe that it can be secure in such an arrangement.

Such a policy has been a more effective in policy. Sooner or later somebody is going to develop better ways to make their products cheaper and thereby make the market away from the price-fixers. Like most responsible American corporations, we

think it is better to be "somebody." It has been our experience that a clique which has run into the dead-end street of price-fixing, has had its business manipulated in a way that is the nearest kind of competition.

Under these conditions, our government in its national emergency has to step in and control prices. We are in such a period now, when the government would result from sharp rise in commodity prices. But even in such an emergency, price control should be handled with a measure of flexibility and kindness of purpose.

3. We are for business dealing with people in foreign countries. The American has traditionally frowned the face of the high dumping back new things for make into the war-time market, for our citizens and carrying the spirit of the American standard of living to people in other lands.

The bitter experience of too bloody and costly wars has shown that international trade must be increased, planned, and intelligently made easier and freer, especially in the nations of the world.

The responsibility for such planning seems to us to be with representatives of our government working together with the representatives of the governments of other nations.

Of course, when American business men do business in other countries, they must do business the way that country does. They must obey the laws of the land. No matter how much they may prefer the way we do business in this country, no American business man can hope to change the political structure of a foreign country just to suit his convenience. For example, our government in 1922 agreed American companies to secure rights to produce oil in the Near East. We attempted to acquire interests in Iraq. After six years of arduous preparation, we entered into an agreement which limited to a certain percentage our share of the oil to be produced and restricted

our producing activities throughout the whole area.

In the United States such a contract would probably violate the Sherman Anti-Trust Act. The point is that if America was to get any of the oil of Iraq, American companies had to abide by the conditions imposed by international competition.

4. We are against secret agreements. We think that secret agreements are a bad business policy—and that in our American democracy there is a fundamental reason for this position. In this country we are dedicated to the principle that the will of the people shall prevail. It is this principle that is effective, it means that the people must have the facts on which to form their opinions.

It has been our observation that the judgment of the American people has been consistently right when it has the facts. Any business which deliberately follows a policy of secrecy and mystery is vulnerable to the attacks of any individual who sees some personal advantage in stirring up prejudice based on misrepresentation and distortion of the truth.

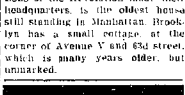
Of course, there are times when publication of the facts is against the national interest. But here, again, responsibility for this decision should rest with government.

We are ready to file with the Department of State—or some other designated government agency—copies of all contracts that we make with foreign corporations. If that agency considers publication of the facts to be in the public interest, we are for publishing them to the world.

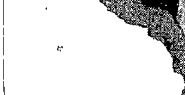
