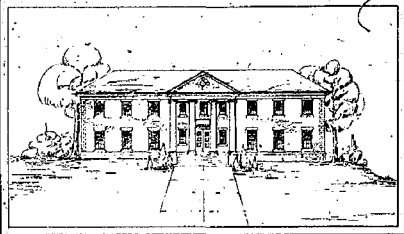

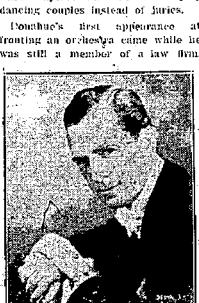

Pulliam Announces Release of \$16,000 Of Disputed \$30,000

President Roscoe Pulliam announced that the release of \$16,000 of a disputed \$30,000 appropriation to Southern Illinois Normal University was recommended by newly appointed Finance Director Al Carter of Murphysboro and immediately approved by Gov. John Stoeber.

A new hearing was granted the college by Carter whose appointment followed the resignation of Sam L. Stebbins, former director of Finance. Pulliam was criticized by President Pulliam this summer for refusal to release the fund.

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MAXWELL SAYS MUSEUM ACCOMPLISHMENTS HAVE BEEN DUE TO COOPERATION OF COLLEGE

"B" NATURAL

BY "BETHOVEN"
Although music and war seem to be two unrelated subjects, they nevertheless have joined forces in England for one purpose—that of defeating Hitler. Bullets and bombs, planes and tanks are turned out to the accompaniment of Chopin waltzes and Beethoven symphonies. Where the clatter of construction makes this impossible, workers are treated to recitals during rest periods. As a result, production has been speeded up from six to twelve percent.

This weird combination is no fantastic brain child of a crackpot; it is a cynical denunciation of beauty. It is only the realization of the fact that the relationship between music and war is the coordinating element; the rhythm of music guides the movement of the workers; and a surge of power and excitement accompanies their motion. Production is up because music has an appeal to the human spirit that cannot be analyzed in terms so simple as melody, harmony, and rhythm.

If England refuses to sacrifice her musical life at a time when the whole empire stands at bay, it is because she knows that music is no longer a luxury. Its power is as mysterious as electricity, but alongside the great generators in British armories today, you find musicians playing Beethoven and Chopin.

OFF THE ECHOS
In a more cheerful light we find an unexpected combination of the Alec Wilder octet which has clarinet, bass, oboe, bassoon, horn, trumpet, drums, and bass clarinet. In "The Children Meet the Train," a lively number, the more serious instruments seem uneasy, but in the moody "Sold on the Sun," they are more at ease. But you can't shoot the boys for trying.

meyer, who broke up the pass. The Arkansas griders made only one really serious threat during the contest. In the fourth quarter, by a series of aerial thrusts they carried the ball to the Southern nine yard line. Here, however, the Maroons dug in and held off the battering of the State and relinquished only two yards to the invaders in the latter's four tries. Shortly before the end of the first half, however, the Arkansas squad lunged what might have turned out to be a scoring opportunity. On this occasion they had made their first lengthy march via their punting attack to the Maroon 15 yard line. On their first play they were penalized 15 yards for holding and were thus shoved back to the 30 yard line and out of striking distance of the E. N. H. goal.

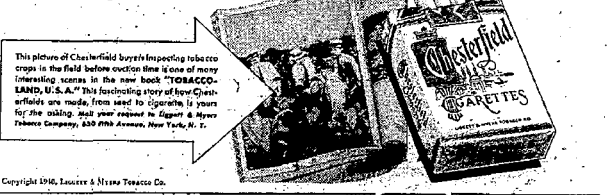
Maroons Outplayed
Although outclassed in yardage gained and passes completed, the Maroons capitalized on their alertness to score their second victory.
