Schools being represented here today are Greenville College, Greenville, Eureka College, Eureka, The Principia College, Eliza; St. Louis University, St. Louis, Mo.; Southwestern Baptist College, Bolivar, Mo.; Webster College, Webster Groves, Mo.; Lake Forest College, Lake Forest; Eastern Illinois State Teachers College, Charleston; Murray State Teachers College, Murray, Ky.; Illinois State Normal University, Normal; Rockhurst College, Kansas City, Mo.; and Southwestern University, Memphis, Tenn.

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### SOUTHERN TO HOLD SCIENCE DAY FOR HIGH SCHOOLS

Southern's science departments, in cooperation with the southern section of the Junior Academy of Science of the State of Illinois, will hold a field day on this campus, April 15, to demonstrate the work done by biology students in high schools of Southern Illinois. Invitations have been sent to all high schools in the southern third of the State, according to Dr. W. Welch, chairman of the biology department and acting chairman of the biology department of the field day committee.

The program will start with arrangements of exhibits, between 8 and 10 a. m. in the old gym. These exhibits will be arranged in the following groups: biology, physics, chemistry, aeronautics, photography, weather, general science, geology, and notebooks. Exhibits will be judged by members of Southern's faculty, in order of first, second, third, and outstanding award. This judging will take place between 10 and 12 a. m. One student from the high school exhibiting the work must accompany each exhibit during the judging.

The high school students will be divided into two groups. One will attend a series of movies of various subjects in science, including one on the atomic bomb tests that were carried on in New Mexico. The other will tour the campus under the direction of one of the various students service groups on the campus. This will be reversed at 11 o'clock. From 1 to 2 p. m. both groups will visit the exhibits which have been given awards in the morning. Dr. A. J. Carlson, professor emeritus of physiology, University of Chicago, will address the students at 2 o'clock in Shryock auditorium. Local residents are invited to attend this lecture.

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# Sebastian Scores 32 Points As Maroons Annex Loop Title

## Holder-Men Visit Huskies For Final IIA Loop Tilt; Point For Kansas City

The Illinois Intercollegiate Athletic Conference champions, with the crown won and the pressure temporarily off, are relaxing this week with only one scheduled game yet to be played before they hit the road for Kansas City, March 10. Coach Lynn Holder will take his Maroons up to De Kalb tomorrow for a last fling in conference competition in a game which won't mean a thing as far as their final standing is concerned.

De Kalb, in the role of giant-killer, has knocked the Maroons out of a football championship for the last two years, in the seasons' final game. The stage was set for her to have another chance at blasting Southern tiller hopes until the Holdermen went wild against Normal last Monday to cinch the crown.

De Kalb, despite her three and four record in credit play this year, is not to be taken lightly. She took Macomb into camp last week, just after Macomb had edged out Charleston, who, you'll remember, have given the Maroons

position and is in no danger of losing it.

With one championship safely tucked away the Maroons can now turn their eyes toward Kansas City. The competition there is going to be of a high calibre this year, much higher than last. The path to victory is going to be a rough and rocky one, but the Maroons will go a long way up it, if they play up to their limit. If they perform as they did last Monday night, they will be the fan's favorite team, as they were last season.

The starting lineup will probably remain as it has in recent games with John Sebastian and Oliver Shoaff as forwards, Quentin Stinson at center, and Bob Colburn and Gene Hall at guards. Other men making the trip will be Sam Milosevich, Ledio Cabutti, Charles Coas, Boyd Wilson, and John Ruzick.

## Second League Crown For Southern Cagers

Playing before a home crowd for the last time in his collegiate career Johnny "Mr. Two Hands" Sebastian of Odin led the Maroons to their second straight Illinois Intercollegiate Athletic Conference crown by firing 32 points through the net in Southern's 86-53 victory over State Normal Monday in the Carbondale gym.

Also making their last home appearance were Gene Hall of Galatia, who also played a brilliant game, and Sam Milosevich of Zeigler, who played well in the short time he was in the game. Oliver "Mr. One Hand" Shoaff of Mt. Carmel, followed Sebastian in total points as he poured 21 points through the basket. Quentin Stinson of Eldorado scored 13 points, and Bob Olson, freshman guard from Flora, made nine points.

Sebastian was striving for the conference scoring record, and although he fell four points shy of tying the record, he played one of the most brilliant games of his career.

He fouled out in the last few minutes of the game, and as he left, he received a tremendous ovation from the crowd, which was packed into the gymnasium.

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
