Can Scholarship Be Overemphasized?

In education for democracy should emphasis be placed upon individual scholarship or upon the promotion of a so-cial consciousness? Can we advance society as a whole better by creating an "intellectual aristocracy" through high scholastic requirements, or can we advance society better by placing moral character and social consciousness above scholar ship?

Those persons defending high scholastic requirements will probably contend that there is a high correlation between grade point average and moral character and social consciousness. But the EGYPTIAN is of the opinion that those placing emphasis upon mass adoption of humanitarian ideals can grant that contention and still have the best of the argument

The EGYPTIAN believes that more and more people must be educated—with little or no emphasis upon scholastic requirements. This does not mean that intellectual leadership quirements. This does not mean that interaction issued will be abblished—quite the opposite. With more people being educated and acquiring the social consciousness necessary to abprogressive sopiety, A LARGER NUMBER OF SINCERE, INTELLECTUAL LEADERS WILLT ARISE THAN CAN EXIST UNDER ANY EDUCATIONAL SYSTEM PLACING GREAT EMPHASIS ON MERE SCHOL-ARSHIP. The competitive process in education will continue to advance those who are intellectually more capable and efficient. Thus not only will the intellectually superior be given the opportunity of advancement but the masses will also be given a definite and necessary part in promoting the ideal, progressive society. Mass movements for the improvement of society may emanate from the scholastically superior-but no movement can ever rest upon firm and permanent foundations without mass support.

Toward Vocational Training-

According to recent reports, the outstanding trend in public education in Missouri is toward vocational training and rehabilitation. High schools offering courses in voca tional agriculture have increased more than 40 per cent since 1935 and enrollment in these classes has increased 53 per cent.

There is a 9 per cent increase in the number of high schools maintaining vocational departments. During the last school year, greater interest was shown in vocational education and rehabilitation by adults as well as by teachers and students. Eighteen Missouri high schools now provide training for employment comparable to the courses offered in city trade schools.

The vocational rehabilitation program corrected 314 cases: 174 of these were placed in gainful employment after receiving vocational training. The average cost of training was \$160.69 per person,

Verbatim--

"He must not only be a person of refinement and culture, but a person of broad sympathy and appreciation of other departmental interests. And, more by example than by precept, he should influence the students on his campus." Dr. Guy E. Snavely, director of the Association of American Colleges, maintains that the college teacher should not be a narrow, specialist lacking in some perparation and considerable general interest in other subjects.

"Sconer or later these must be a separation of those institutions which look upon intercollegiate athletics as mere adjuncts of educational programs from those whose tasms are made up of hired preformers." 
