A remarkably small attendance, considering the summer term enrollment, was present at the opening number of the S. I. T. C. Entertainment Course for the summer session. A capable, if not extremely outstanding, group of artists presented a vocal program of far above average entertainment value to college students.

It seems a particularly unfavorable reflection upon the school teachers of Southern Illinois when one considers that a majority of summer session students here are regularly employed as teach of summer seasons sourced are regularly employed as exer-ers in elementary schools. If these teachers are not sufficiently interested in hearing really worth while entertainment, it seems hardly likely that they will inspire any liking of, or appreciation for, the finer arts in their pupils. Since this phase of elementary education is becoming increasingly important and is being recognized by educational authorities, it seems that teachers now en rolled here should keep pace with this development. This keeping pace may be done at no added expense by attendance at these presentations.

Of course, the objection will be raised that summer session students are commuting and could not return to Carbondale for any entertainment course numbers. Even so, statistics on how many summer session student attended "movies" in their home towns would probably be interesting and show that expense is not an item in their staying away from the Series number.

From a purely economic standpoint, as well, the summer sesreon a purely economic standpoint, as well, the summer season students-are simply spiting themselves by absenting themselves from the course numbers. Since payment of the activity fee is cosnutisoks and is made in advance, the student who fails to take advantage of this privilege is not hurting the college financially but is Josing, both economically and culturally. himself, with an eye to courtesy and the reputation of Southern

Illinois as desiring culture, the attendance at the Master Singers performance was disgraceful. In all too many regions, Southern Illinois has the reputation, largely mistakenly acquired, of being made up of ignorant, foreign-born coal-miners. This reputation is certainly not refuted when only one-third of the college enrollment attends a program of cultural benefit. If we are to be regarded by other people as a college promoting culture and the finer arts we will have to earn this regard by presence at and support of the cultural attractions presented by this college.

There is remarkably little reason to create a liberal arts college at an institution whose student body is seemingly interested only in securing the forty-eight credits needed for graduation.
